


The National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) assesses reading on a 0-500 point scale. In 2003, Cleveland Municipal SD was one of nine urban districts that voluntarily participated in the NAEP reading assessment on a trial basis.

Overall Reading Results for Cleveland

- In 2003, the average scale score for fourth-grade students in Cleveland was 195. This was lower¹ than that of the nation's public schools (216).
- Cleveland's average score (195) in 2003 was lower than that of public schools in large central cities² (205), and lower than that of Ohio (222).
- The percentage of students in Cleveland who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 9 percent in 2003. The percentage of students in Cleveland who performed at or above the *Basic* level was 35 percent.

NOTE: The NAEP reading scale ranges from 0 to 500, with the achievement levels corresponding to the following points: *Below Basic*, 207 or lower; *Basic*, 208-237; *Proficient*, 238-267; *Advanced*, 268 or above.

Average Score Gaps Between Selected Groups

- In 2003, male students in Cleveland had an average score that was lower than that of female students (9 points). This performance gap was not significantly different from that of the Nation (8 points).
- In 2003, White students had an average score that was higher than that of Black students (17 points). This performance gap was narrower than that of the Nation (30 points).
- In 2003, White students had an average score that was not found to be significantly different from that of Hispanic students. In the Nation, White students had an average score that was higher than that of Hispanic students.
- The sample size was not sufficient to permit a reliable estimate for students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch compared to students who were eligible in Cleveland.

An examination of scores at different percentiles on the 0-500 NAEP reading scale at each grade indicates how well students at lower, middle, and higher levels of the distribution performed. For example, the data above show that 75 percent of students in public schools nationally scored below 243, and 75 percent of students in Cleveland scored below 217.

¹ Comparisons (higher/lower/not different) are based on statistical tests. The .05 level was used for testing statistical significance. Performance comparisons may be affected by differences in exclusion rates for students with disabilities and limited-English-proficient students in the NAEP samples and changes in sample sizes. NAEP sample sizes have increased since 2002 compared to previous years, resulting in smaller detectable differences than in previous assessments.

² "Large central city" includes nationally representative public schools located in large central cities within metropolitan statistical areas as defined by the federal Office of Management and Budget. It is not synonymous with "inner city."

³ For comparison, minority students comprised 77 percent of students in large central city public schools and 41 percent in public schools nationally. Also, students eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch comprised 69 percent of students in large central city public schools and 44 percent in public schools nationally.

NOTE: Detail may not sum to totals because of rounding, and because the "Information not available" category for Free/reduced-price lunch is not displayed. Statistical comparisons are calculated on the basis of unrounded scale scores or percentages.
