



Overall Results

- In 2009, the average score of eighth-grade students in Houston was 277. This was higher than the average score of 271 for public school students in large cities.
- The average score for students in Houston in 2009 (277) was not significantly different from their average score in 2007 (273) and was higher than their average score in 2003 (264).
- In 2009, the score gap between students in Houston at the 75th percentile and students at the 25th percentile was 42 points. This performance gap was not significantly different from that of 2003 (39 points).
- The percentage of students in Houston who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 24 percent in 2009. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2007 (21 percent) and was greater than that in 2003 (12 percent).
- The percentage of students in Houston who performed at or above the NAEP Basic level was 69 percent in 2009. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2007 (65 percent) and was greater than that in 2003 (52 percent).


Scores at Selected Percentiles

Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2009, female students in Houston had an average score that was not significantly different from that of male students.
- In 2009, Black students had an average score that was 45 points lower than that of White students. This performance gap was wider than that in 2003 (34 points).
- In 2009, Hispanic students had an average score that was 36 points lower than that of White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2003 (32 points).
- In 2009, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low income, had an average score that was 25 points lower than that of students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2003 (18 points).
