


#### **Overall Results**

- In 2009, the average score of fourth-grade students in Cleveland was 213. This was lower than the average score of 231 for public school students in large cities.
- The average score for students in Cleveland in 2009 (213) was not significantly different from their average score in 2007 (215) and was not significantly different from their average score in 2003 (215).
- In 2009, the score gap between students in Cleveland at the 75th percentile and students at the 25th percentile was 36 points. This performance gap was not significantly different from that of 2003 (35 points).
- The percentage of students in Cleveland who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 8 percent in 2009. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2007 (10 percent) and was not significantly different from that in 2003 (10 percent).
- The percentage of students in Cleveland who performed at or above the NAEP Basic level was 51 percent in 2009. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2007 (53 percent) and was not significantly different from that in 2003 (51 percent).


## **Scores at Selected Percentiles**

### **Score Gaps for Student Groups**

- In 2009, female students in Cleveland had an average score that was not significantly different from that of male students.
- In 2009, Black students had an average score that was 19 points lower than that of White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2003 (24 points).
- In 2009, Hispanic students had an average score that was 11 points lower than that of White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2003 (14 points).
- Data are not reported for students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch in 2009, because reporting standards were not met.

NOTE: Statistical comparisons are calculated on the basis of unrounded scale scores or percentages.
