


**Overall Results**

- In 2011, the average score of eighth-grade students in District of Columbia was 112. This was lower than the average score of 151 for public school students in the nation.
- The percentage of students in District of Columbia who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 8 percent in 2011. This percentage was smaller than the nation (31 percent).
- The percentage of students in District of Columbia who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 24 percent in 2011. This percentage was smaller than the nation (64 percent).

**Compare the Average Score in 2011 to Other States/Jurisdictions**



In 2011, the average score in **District of Columbia** (112) was

- lower than those in 51 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 0 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 0 states/jurisdictions

**Score Gaps for Student Groups**

- In 2011, Black students had an average score that was 67 points lower than White students. This performance gap was wider than the nation (35 points).
- In 2011, Hispanic students had an average score that was 58 points lower than White students. This performance gap was wider than the nation (27 points).
- In 2011, male students in District of Columbia had an average score that was not significantly different from female students.
- In 2011, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 27 points lower than students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch. This performance gap was not significantly different from the nation (27 points).
