Need help with your SLDS? You don't need to be a grantee of the Statewide Longitudinal Data Systems (SLDS) Grant Program to access its many services and resources. In addition to funding the development and use of SLDSs, the SLDS program offers a wide range of support to help states and territories succeed in their SLDS efforts and sustain the systems over time.

What Is the State Support Team?

The **State Support Team (SST)** is a key component of the SLDS program's strategy to help ensure that states and territories are successful in their data efforts. The SST, a group of experienced data systems experts, provide a range of technical assistance in the development, management, and use of SLDSs. Types of Assistance Available

Common areas of SST assistance include, but are not limited to, data governance, stakeholder engagement, project management, sustainability, and data use. The SST also provides assistance in areas such as transparency, collaboration and linkage of data across state and local agencies, vendor management, system design, strategic planning, and implementation of research agendas.

SST assistance is provided in many forms. The types of support provided by the SST are based on state and territory needs and evolve in response to the current challenges in the field. The SST assists via:

Individual Assistance


The SST can provide state- and territory-specific assistance through services such as regular checkin calls and on-site visits; reviewing project plans and other documents; providing resources, training, and examples; connecting states with their peers who have faced similar challenges; and other support. Each state and territory has a SST point of contact who can help identify and respond to your SLDS-related needs.

Multistate Assistance

The SLDS program and SST offer a host of multistate supports, including the annual SLDS Best Practices Conference, an online resource sharing repository, SLDS-created publications, topical working groups, webinars, interactive topical communities of practice, the Personnel Exchange Network, and a listsery. Travel support for a limited number of nongrantees to the conferences and workshops is available.

Through grants and a wide range of services and resources, the SLDS program has helped propel the successful design, development, implementation, expansion, and use of K12 and P-20W+ (early learning through the workforce) longitudinal data systems. These systems increase states' capacity to efficiently and accurately manage, analyze, and use education, social service, workforce, and other statewide data. SLDSs help policymakers, program administrators, educators, and other stakeholders make data-informed decisions to take actions that increase student outcomes and facilitate research to improve policies and service provision.

Background

Authorized by the Educational Technical Assistance Act of 2002, Title II of the statute that created the Institute of Education Sciences, the SLDS Grant Program has awarded competitive, cooperative agreement grants to states since 2005. Grants extend 3 to 5 years and require grantees to submit annual reports and a final report on the completion of their grant objectives. All 50 states, 5 territories, and the District of Columbia are eligible to apply.
