

# Revenues and Expenditures for Public Elementary and Secondary Education: FY 21

This set of tables introduces new data for national and state-level public elementary and secondary revenues and expenditures for fiscal year (FY) 2021. Specifically, these tables include the following school finance data:

- revenue and expenditure totals;
- revenues by source;
- expenditures by function and object;
- current expenditures;1
- revenues and current expenditures per pupil;<sup>2</sup>
- expenditures from Title I funds; and
- revenues and expenditures from COVID-19 Federal Assistance Funds.

The expenditure functions include instruction, instructional staff support services, student support services, general administration, school administration, operations and maintenance, student transportation, other support services (such as business services), food services, and enterprise operations. Objects reported within a function include salaries and wages, employee benefits,

purchased services, supplies, and equipment.

The finance data used in these tables are from the National Public Education Financial Survey (NPEFS), a component of the Common Core of Data (CCD). The CCD is the primary National Center for Education Statistics (NCES) database on public elementary and secondary education in the United States.

State education agencies (SEAs) in each of the 50 states; the District of Columbia; and the five other jurisdictions of American Samoa, Guam, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands report these data annually to NCES.

The tables in this report present descriptive information on the revenues and expenditures for FY 21. The tables chosen for this report demonstrate the range of information available when using NPEFS. They do not represent all of the data and are not meant to emphasize any particular issue.

#### **DATA**

The tables present data from the FY 21 NPEFS provisional (version 1a) data file and the FY 20 NPEFS final (version 2a) data file.<sup>3</sup> Tables for FY 20 can be found online at <a href="https://nces.ed.gov/ccd/data\_tables.asp">https://nces.ed.gov/ccd/data\_tables.asp</a>. The student membership data used in these tables come from the State Nonfiscal Public Elementary/ Secondary Education Survey, school year 2018-19 through 2020-21 version 1a.<sup>4</sup> The Title I allocation amounts used in this report are derived from the U.S.

SEAs report data for CCD surveys annually to NCES. The U.S. Census Bureau conducts the data collection for the finance surveys on behalf of NCES. NCES collects data for all three CCD nonfiscal universe surveys through the EDFacts submission system. SEAs participate in CCD voluntarily, following standard definitions for the data items they report.

The NPEFS instructions ask SEAs to report revenues and expenditures covering prekindergarten through high school public education in regular, special, and vocational schools; charter schools; and staterun education programs (such as special education schools or education programs for incarcerated youth).

### **ENDNOTES**

<sup>1</sup> Current expenditures comprise expenditures for the day-to-day operation of schools and school districts for public elementary and secondary education, including expenditures for staff salaries and benefits, supplies, and purchased services. General administration expenditures and school administration expenditures are also included in current expenditures. Expenditures associated with repaying debts and capital outlays (e.g., purchases of land, school construction, and equipment) are excluded from current expenditures. Programs outside the scope of public prekindergarten through grade 12 education, such as community services and adult education, are not included in current expenditures. Payments to private schools and payments to charter schools outside of the school district are also excluded from current expenditures. Researchers generally use current expenditures instead of total expenditures when comparing education spending between states or across districts because current expenditures exclude expenditures for capital outlay, which tend to have dramatic increases and decreases from year to year. Also, many school districts support community services, adult education, private education, and other nonelementary-secondary programs, which are included in total expenditures. These programs and the extent to which they are funded by school districts vary greatly both across and within states and school districts.

<sup>2</sup> Revenues per pupil is calculated by dividing total revenues by student membership. Current expenditures per pupil is calculated by dividing total current expenditures by student membership. The student membership data are derived from the State Nonfiscal Public Elementary/Secondary Education Survey.

<sup>3</sup> The FY 19 and FY 20 data presented in tables 2, 5, and 9 of this report were adjusted to FY 21 dollars. Inflation adjustments utilize the Consumer Price Index (CPI) published by the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics. This price index measures the average change in inflation of a fixed market basket of goods and

services purchased by consumers. For comparability with the time period covered by fiscal education data, NCES adjusts the CPI from a calendar year to a school fiscal year basis (July through June). The FY 20 amount adjusted to FY 21 dollars is equal to the FY 20 amount multiplied by the 2020-21 CPI (263.151) and then divided by the 2019-20 CPI (257.230). The FY 19 amount adjusted to FY 21 dollars is equal to the FY 19 amount multiplied by the 2020-21 CPI (263.151) and then divided by the 2018-19 CPI (253.268).

<sup>4</sup> The FY 21 NPEFS data file includes total student membership reported on the school year 2020-21 State Nonfiscal Public Elementary/Secondary Education Survey that includes grades prekindergarten through grade 12 (plus ungraded). If the reported fiscal data exclude prekindergarten programs, total membership on the NPEFS data file also excludes prekindergarten membership. As part of the FY 21 NPEFS collection process, NCES asked SEAs to review student membership data from the State Nonfiscal Public Elementary/Secondary Education Survey and verify that the membership data are consistent with the programs covered in the revenues and expenditures data reported in NPEFS.

Arizona, New York, and Oregon indicated that the state fiscal data reported in NPEFS did not include finance data for prekindergarten programs. In these states, the NPEFS total student membership variable excludes prekindergarten membership. California did not report prekindergarten membership in the State Nonfiscal Public Elementary/ Secondary Education Survey. In FY 19 and FY 21, the prekindergarten membership reported in the State Nonfiscal Public Elementary/Secondary Education Survey public release file was imputed based on the number of preschool students with disabilities, as

reported for the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act. Prekindergarten membership is likely much higher; therefore, the NPEFS total student membership variable excludes all prekindergarten membership counts reported in the State Nonfiscal Public Elementary/ Secondary Education Survey for California in FY 19, FY 20, and FY 21. For FY 19, FY 20, and FY 21, California reported expenditures for the California State Preschool Program separately, and these expenditures were excluded from the amounts in these tables. However, expenditures for special education preschool programs are included along with K-12 expenditures.

Illinois and New Hampshire indicated that the state fiscal data reported in NPEFS did not include independent charter school districts, and students in those independent charter school districts are excluded from the NPEFS total student membership.

<sup>5</sup> These tables present the calculated allocation amounts for Title I grants under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act. Schools with high percentages of children from lowincome families are eligible for Title I grants, based primarily on census poverty estimates as published by the U.S. Department of Education for the following formula grant programs: Grants to Local Education Agencies (Basic, Concentration, Targeted, and Education Finance Incentive Grants), Migrant Education, and Neglected and Delinquent Children. Title I grants data are from Digest of Education Statistics 2021, table 401.60. FY 20 U.S. Department of Education funds are available for spending by school districts beginning with the 2020-21 school year. Allocations were made in FY 20 and became available for use in the 2020-21 school year. Actual amounts received by local education

agencies (LEAs) may be smaller than those presented due to state-level adjustments to federal Title I allocations and permitted state reservations for administration and school improvement activities.

Title I expenditures are reported by states on NPEFS as either current year or carryover expenditures. A provision in the Title I statute allows LEAs to carry over a portion of the funds allocated to be spent in future fiscal years; however, some states did not separate carryover expenditures from current year expenditures in their NPEFS reporting. As a result, current year expenditures may exceed the total allocation amount for a particular state.

LEAs may also receive Title I funding through competitive grant programs. Title I expenditures reported on NPEFS include all expenditures for Title I programs, including both formula and competitive grants. While these competitive programs account for a small proportion of total Title I funds, the inclusion of these programs may cause expenditures to exceed the total allocation amount for a particular state.

The law does not stipulate how Title I funds are to be spent. Many Title I funds are used to support schoolwide programs, such as extended-day kindergarten programs; learning laboratories in mathematics, science, and computers; afterschool and summer programs to extend and reinforce the regular school curriculum; and other services to extend and accelerate academic progress. Thus, Title I expenditures per pupil are calculated by dividing the total of current year and carryover expenditures by student membership, which includes both Title I eligible students and noneligible students.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>2</sup> Revenues from federal sources include amounts received from funds authorized by the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act of 2020, the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations (CRRSA) Act of 2021, and the American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act of 2021. Local education agencies (LEAs) do not begin receiving federal funds that flow through the state until after allocations are made by the federal government, assurances and certifications are signed and awards are made by the state, and reimbursement for expenditures is requested by the LEA. Because of this process, there is a lag between the time when the funds are appropriated and when LEAs record the amounts as revenues.
