Foreword

The National Postsecondary Student Aid Study of 1993 (NPSAS:93) is the third in a series of large-scale data collections on the topic of student financial aid and postsecondary education enrollments sponsored by the National Center for Education Statistics. The students included in NPSAS:93 were enrolled as either undergraduate or graduate students during the 1992–93 academic year. The two earlier versions of the NPSAS were carried out in 1987 (including students enrolled during the fall term in 1986) and in 1990 (including students enrolled in the 1989–90 academic year). These data sets are designed to enhance our understanding of the role of financial aid in financing postsecondary education, as well as to chronicle patterns of enrollment at the postsecondary level.

This report focuses on undergraduate students only, and examines how undergraduate students enrolled in the 1992–93 academic year financed their education. The report begins with an essay that explores in some detail the relationships between the type of institution in which students were enrolled and their total costs of attendance, the distribution of financial aid among students by type of institution, and the net costs of enrollment among aided and nonaided undergraduates. The compendium of tables that follows provides additional detail on each of the topics addressed in the essay. In addition, the compendium tables include data on the demographic characteristics of students enrolled in each institution type and on the distribution of financial aid by type (grants, loans, work-study, and other), and data by source (federal, state, institutional, and other). The table compendium contains four sections: student demographics, the costs of postsecondary education, the distribution of financial aid, and the net costs of postsecondary education. Each section is prefaced by a series of bullets that highlight the findings. This format illustrates both the level of detail that can be achieved in an analysis that uses the NPSAS:93 data as well as the broad scope of the information in these files.

The Costs of Undergraduate Education Before and After Receipt of Financial Aid: 1992–93

I. Introduction

Students and their families used various means to pay for postsecondary education in 1992–93. What they paid from their own resources—their *net costs*—varied with the type of institution attended and the receipt of student financial aid.¹ However, the price that students and their families paid for postsecondary education had as much to do with decisions about where to enroll, whether to attend full or part time, and whether to live on campus, off campus, or with parents or other relatives as with the receipt of financial aid. In many cases, the average differences in costs related to such decisions in 1992–93 were greater than the average amount of financial aid received. So while the effects of financial aid on the cost of undergraduate education in 1992–93 are examined here, ways in which the price of enrollment is shaped through decisions made by students and their families are examined first.

What Is Net Cost and How Is It Measured?

Before discussing how price varies with the decisions made by students, it will be useful to explore what is meant by net cost. Net cost usually refers to that portion of total costs that students and their families pay from their own resources after receipt of financial aid. Total costs include tuition and fees, room and board, books and supplies, and other (which includes such things as transportation and entertainment).² Analyses of the cost of postsecondary education typically focus on net cost rather than total cost, because it is the amount that students and their families must finance out of their own income, savings, or other assets that is likely to have the greatest impact on their educational decisions.

This emphasis on net cost derives from the two main goals of the student financial aid system: to increase access to postsecondary education by eliminating financial barriers to entry, and to increase the number of institutional choices a student has by reducing the direct cost of attendance. A third goal, persistence in postsecondary education, is often added to this list, since neither choice nor access count for much if students cannot afford to persist in their education. In order to accomplish these goals, most financial aid is awarded on the basis of financial need. Financial need is defined by formula, which takes into account the income and assets of students and their families, the estimated total cost of

¹The terms *price* and *cost* are used interchangeably throughout this essay, although price is the more accurate term. postsecondary education, and a variety of special factors such as the number of siblings in college.³ In these need analyses, students' enrollment and living arrangement decisions are often taken as given, mostly because aid eligibility cannot be determined until these decisions have been made. Once made, however, total estimated costs are fixed, and the student's financial needs can be evaluated. Net costs—the amount that students and their families actually pay from their own resources—can then be defined as the total cost of enrollment less any financial aid received.

However, there are any number of ways to calculate the value of a financial aid award, and how this is done has a big impact on net costs.⁴ When aid is awarded, its value is simply the sum of all the aid delivered to the student. This makes sense since the purpose of financial aid is to reduce the current direct cost of attendance so that cost alone does not prevent entry into postsecondary education nor preclude enrollment at the student's first-choice institution. When valued as the sum of all aid awarded, financial aid more or less equalized net costs among independent students at all income levels, and among dependent students whose parents had incomes up to about \$50,000. These results were achieved because students with lower incomes or from lower income families received more financial aid, on average, than students with higher incomes or from higher income families.

While valuing financial aid as the sum of all aid delivered to the student may make sense when the goal is to equalize the current direct cost of attendance, there is considerable debate about the real impact of financial aid in reducing total costs. The reason is that different types of aid affect the total amount that students or their families will actually pay for education in different ways. For example, grants reduce the cost of attendance in absolute terms. Student loans, by contrast, defer the cost of attendance until the student leaves postsecondary education. However, since loans are generally subsidized by the federal government, the value of loans is often set at the average value of the subsidy, which is estimated to be between 20 and 40 percent of the face value of the loan.⁵ Work-study neither reduces the costs of attendance nor defers them, but instead enables the student to defray the costs through higher levels of current income. When net costs are measured as total costs less only grant aid, net costs are higher than when all aid is taken into account; however, the effects of excluding loans and work-study are most apparent among lower income students because of their greater dependence on financial aid of all types.

³The Congressional Methodology formula was the formula used for determining need in 1992–93. Financial need by this formula was defined as the estimated cost of attendance at a particular institution minus the expected family contribution (EFC). The EFC was determined by the formula, and included adjustments for the student's financial dependency status, the number of siblings or dependents in college, the student's income and assets, and among financially dependent students, the parents' income and assets. With few exceptions, it was only when the cost of attendance was higher than the EFC that the student was eligible for need-based financial aid. As mandated by the Higher Education Amendments of 1992, the EFC is now produced using a needs-analysis formula known as the Federal Needs Analysis Methodology. These findings show that financial aid is clearly important in reducing the price of postsecondary education to students and their families, particularly among those from lower income backgrounds. However, one problem with narrowly focusing on the effects of financial aid is that it deflects attention from the ways in which students and their families shape the costs that they incur, whether or not they receive financial aid. Three-fifths of all students enrolled in 1992–93 did not receive any financial aid; they financed their education completely from their own or their family’s resources. For this group, net costs were the same as total costs because there was no financial aid to net out. Even among students who did receive financial aid, more than half of the total cost was paid, on average, from the student’s or the student’s family’s own resources.

The next section explores how the price of postsecondary education varied with the type of institution attended, and how prices varied within institutions by students’ enrollment status and living arrangements. In the third section, the focus turns to the distribution of financial aid and the average amount of aid undergraduates received. The fourth section looks at the net price of postsecondary education at each institution type, and explores how net price varied by family or student income and by financial aid status. Finally, the last section summarizes the findings and conclusions of this essay.

II. Average Costs of Postsecondary Education by Institution Type in 1992–93

The average cost of postsecondary education varied with the type of institution the student attended. In general, institutions that offered longer term programs were more costly than institutions that offered only shorter term programs, and private institutions were generally more costly than public institutions that offered programs of similar length.⁶ Because of the strong correlation between the type of institution a student attended and the costs that the student incurred, this essay focuses on the cost differences among the four largest institution types: public 2-year, with 43 percent of all postsecondary enrollments in 1992–93; public 4-year, with 31 percent of all postsecondary enrollments; private, not-for-profit 4-year, with 14 percent of all enrollments; and private, for-profit, with 8 percent of all enrollments.⁷ Since other institution types—public less-than-2-year, and private, not-for-profit less-than-4-year—each accounted for less than 2 percent of all postsecondary enrollments in 1992–93, they are not examined separately in this essay. The students in these institutions are included in the aggregate categories (such as “all students”), and these institution types are examined separately in the table compendium following the essay.⁸

The average attendance-adjusted total price incurred by undergraduates before receiving financial aid in 1992–93 was \$8,192, but the average costs incurred by students varied widely across the



different institution types (figure 1).⁹ For example, students who were enrolled in public 4-year institutions incurred considerably lower costs than did students enrolled in private, not-for-profit 4-year institutions. Students in public 2-year institutions incurred lower costs on average than did students in the other institution types. Thus, the institution type that students attended had a big impact on the total price of their postsecondary education.

Tuition and fees accounted for most of the variation in the total price of postsecondary education at the different institution types, ranging from an average of \$597 at public 2-year institutions to more than \$8,000 at private, not-for-profit institutions (figure 1). Nontuition costs, by contrast, were about the same at 4-year institutions and at private, for-profit institutions; nontuition costs were somewhat lower at public 2-year institutions, primarily because many of the students at these institutions were enrolled part time.

The prevalence of part-time students had a big impact on the average cost of attendance in the different institution types in 1992–93. Part-time students paid less in tuition and fees than did full-time

⁹Costs were adjusted to reflect students' attendance status. For example, in months that students were enrolled full time, all of the living costs that they reported were included (except for married independent students). In months when they were enrolled less than full time, living expenses for students who were living off campus were reduced to reflect that.

students, and only part of their living expenses were included here in the calculation of total costs.¹⁰ Because only about 15 percent of all students in public 2-year institutions were enrolled fulltime for the entire year, compared to 50 percent in public 4-year institutions, 54 percent in private, not-for-profit 4-year institutions, and 75 percent in private, for-profit institutions (table 1.1 in the compendium), the effects of part-time and full-time enrollment patterns on average costs varied by type of institution.¹¹

Because total average costs and tuition and fees varied with enrollment patterns, grouping students by enrollment status at the different institution types has a big impact on the average cost figures (table 1). For instance, when full-time and part-time students are grouped separately, most of the differences in costs between students enrolled in public 2-year and

public 4-year institutions disappear. On average, students in public 4-year institutions incurred total costs of \$8,904 in 1992–93, compared to an average of \$5,221 among students in public 2-year institutions. Among full-time, full-year undergraduates, those in public 4-year institutions incurred costs of \$11,115, compared to \$9,437 among those in public 2-year institutions. Furthermore, this difference is entirely due to the difference in average tuition and fees at these institutions, which were \$3,044 at the 4-year institutions and \$1,282 at the 2-year institutions in 1992–93. Among students with similar patterns of enrollment at public 2-year and 4-year institutions, nontuition costs were about the same.

Within each institution type, the price of part-time enrollment was substantially less than the price of full-time enrollment. In 4-year private, not-for-profit institutions, students enrolled part time for the full year incurred average costs of \$10,938, substantially less than the \$19,549 incurred, on average, by their full-time, full-year counterparts. Similarly, average costs among part-time students in 4-year public institutions were \$8,560, compared to \$11,115 among full-time students in those institutions. Hence, the current costs that students incur are directly related to the decision to enroll full time or part time.¹²

Like enrollment status, the location of a student's residence had a substantial impact on the total price of their education (table 2). Full-time, full-year students who lived on campus incurred about the same costs, on average, as students who lived off campus, while the average costs incurred by students who were living with their parents were considerably less. Moreover, the differences in average costs between students who were living with their parents and those who were living on campus were quite large. For example, average costs among students enrolled in private, not-for-profit 4-year institutions were \$20,401 for those who lived on campus, compared to \$15,464 for those who lived with their parents. Similarly, part-time or part-year undergraduate students who lived on campus had substantially higher costs than did those who lived with their parents.¹³

¹²The decision to enroll part time may reduce current costs, but may not reduce the total costs incurred to degree completion (among those who plan to get a degree), since enrolling part time also extends the total length of time students will take to earn their degree.

¹³The part-time or part-year designation is misleading in the case of students in private, for-profit institutions. Many of these students were enrolled full time for only part of the year, but the full term for their program was less than a full academic year. Hence, the costs incurred by this group are not directly comparable to the costs incurred by part-time or part-year students in the other institution types.

These price comparisons emphasize the differences between those who lived on campus and those who lived with their parents because both groups were predominantly dependent students, while those who lived off campus were more likely to be independent (table 1.1 in the compendium).¹⁴ The distinction between dependent and independent students is important because the share of total costs accounted for by tuition and fees and by nontuition costs varied with dependency status (table 3). In general, dependent students were more likely to be enrolled full time, and therefore incurred higher average tuition and fees than independent students. Nontuition costs were highest, on average, among independent students with dependents, a difference that reflects the wider range of housing options available to single dependent and independent students than to those who have other family members to consider.

¹⁴Dependency status as defined in federal regulations at the time of the NPSAS:93 survey specified that students 24 years of age or older would be considered financially independent, regardless of their actual financial relationship to their families. Students younger than 24 could also be independent, but only if they could prove they were financially independent of their parents or met any of the other six conditions described in appendix A. This distinction is important for financial aid purposes, because the aid eligibility of dependent students is calculated by taking both parents' and students' assets and income into account, while independent students must report only their own income and assets.

Although the cost comparisons could be further refined by looking at the overlapping effects of dependency status, enrollment status, and living arrangements, doing so will not alter the basic findings reported here.¹⁵ The total average price of undergraduate postsecondary education was highest among students in private, not-for-profit 4-year institutions, followed by those in private, for-profit institutions, and public 4-year institutions. The total average price was lowest among those in public 2-year institutions. This price ranking primarily reflects differences in tuition and fees, since nontuition costs varied little among the institutions. Within each institution type, part-time students faced significantly lower total costs than did students who were enrolled full time. Likewise, students who lived with their parents incurred lower costs, on average, than did students enrolled at the same institution type who lived either on or off campus.

¹⁵A detailed exploration of the complex interactions between financial aid programs, student and family resources, and student choices is beyond the scope of this brief essay. A number of interactions are hinted at in the data reported here, however. For example, receipt of aid and intensity of enrollment are clearly linked, primarily because students must have been enrolled at least half time to be eligible for some financial aid programs. Likewise, educational expenditures and institutional choices appear to be related to family economic circumstances, but how much of an impact financial aid has on expenditures and choice cannot be determined with the data developed for this report.

III. Receipt of Financial Aid by Institution Type in 1992–93

The goals of student financial aid are to promote access, enhance choice, and improve persistence in postsecondary education by reducing the current direct cost of attendance incurred by students. And though the different types of aid have different effects on the price that students actually pay, the current net cost of attendance is less than it otherwise would have been when the student receives any type of student financial aid.

Although many postsecondary institutions award nonneed-based financial aid—academic or athletic scholarships, for example—most student financial aid is awarded on the basis of economic need.¹⁶ Need is defined in relation to total costs and to family income and assets; as a result, receipt of financial aid generally follows the pattern of total average costs by type of institution. In institution types where the average costs are low, relatively few students receive financial aid, and those who do receive relatively small amounts. Where costs are high, a larger percentage of students receive aid, and in somewhat larger amounts.

Overall, about 4 of 10 undergraduates received some type of student financial aid in 1992–93. However, the percentage of students receiving aid in the different institution types varied widely (table 4), ranging from about 27 percent of students enrolled in public 2-year

institutions to about 72 percent of students in private, for-profit institutions. About 35 percent of all undergraduates received a grant; about 20 percent received a loan; and about 5 percent received some type of work-study.¹⁷ Like the percentage of students receiving aid, the composition of financial aid also varied by type of institution.¹⁸

On average, aid recipients received about \$3,953 in 1992–93, but once again, the amount of aid received by undergraduates in the different institution types varied greatly.¹⁹ Aided undergraduates at public 2-year institutions received an average of \$1,854 in 1992–93, compared to about \$3,785 for those in public 4-year institutions, \$4,100 for those in private, for-profit institutions, and \$7,125 for those in private, not-for-profit 4-year institutions. Most of the difference in the total amounts of aid received by undergraduates in private, not-for-profit versus those in private, for-profit institutions was due to the size of their grants: on average, students who received grants in private, for-profit institutions received \$1,960, while grant recipients in private, not-for-profit 4-year institutions received \$4,709.²⁰

IV. Net Costs of Postsecondary Education by Type of Institution in 1992–93

Net Costs by Family and Student Income

Although financial aid is important for many students, responsibility for paying the costs of postsecondary education falls first on students and their families. In 1992–93, the Congressional Methodology established the minimum contribution that a student or the student’s family had to provide before financial aid could be offered.²¹ In cases where the student’s costs were less than the expected family contribution, the student was not eligible for need-based aid. Where costs were higher than the expected family contribution, the student could be eligible for need-based aid (including all grants, loans, and work-study) up to the amount of the difference between costs and the expected contribution.

The primacy of the student’s and the student’s family’s resources is illustrated in figures 2a and 2b, which display average total costs of attendance, average amount of financial aid received, and average

¹⁷Many students received more than one type of financial aid; this is why the average amount of each type of aid does not sum to the total average aid amount, and the percentage of students receiving different types of aid does not sum to the percentage of students receiving any aid.

¹⁸Very few students at either public 2-year institutions or private, for-profit institutions participated in work-study. Work-study aid is distributed through formulas that take into account past participation by an institution (as well as the level of need of the students enrolled) in the campus-based programs. The rules governing the distribution of such aid date back to a time when few community college students needed financial aid, and also predate many of the private, for-profit institutions. Although federal allocations may be lower at less-than-4-year institutions, it may also be that many part-time students do not need a federally-sponsored part-time job because they already have a job.



net costs of attendance by family or student income.²² At every income level, what students and their families paid out of their own resources on average (their net costs) was greater than the average amount of financial aid students received.²³

Figure 2a—Average net costs, average financial aid, and average total costs among dependent undergraduates, by family income: 1992–93





Among both dependent and independent undergraduates, the amount of financial aid received was closely tied to income: as income rose, the average amount of financial aid received by students declined. Among dependent students, both total average costs and average net costs generally rose with income (reflecting the greater probability of full-time, full-year enrollment among higher income undergraduates, their tendency to enroll in more costly institutions, and their lower likelihood of receiving financial aid). By contrast, average net costs did not vary much with income among independent undergraduates. However, the lack of variation in net costs among independent students largely reflects the lower average costs among higher income independent undergraduates, who were predominantly enrolled less than full time in 1992–93.

An interesting feature of the data displayed in figures 2a and 2b is that financial aid substantially reduced the variability in net costs among independent students, and among dependent students whose parents had incomes up to about \$50,000. These results were achieved, in part, because students with lower incomes or from lower income families received more financial aid, on average, than did their

higher income peers.²⁴ At the same time, however, some students from higher income families were able to get financial aid, presumably because the cost of attending the institution of their choice was high, or their family circumstances were unusual (such as having several family members in postsecondary education at the same time).

Net Costs by Income and Type of Institution

A more detailed look at net costs by family or student income and institution type shows that net costs increased with income among dependent students (because the expected family contribution increased with income), regardless of the type of institution attended (table 5). Hence, the apparent equalizing effects of financial aid among dependent students from families with incomes under \$50,000, as shown in figure 2a, reflects not only the effects of financial aid but also the income distribution of students across institution types. Although net costs did not rise steeply among students from families with incomes under \$50,000, they still trended upward with income, except at public 2-year institutions.



Figure 3 contrasts average total costs with average net costs for dependent students in public 4-year and private, not-for-profit 4-year institutions by family income. This graph shows that the net cost

curve for students in both institutions rose more steeply than the corresponding total cost curve. In other words, the net effects of financial aid were greater for students from lower income families than for students from higher income families at both institution types. Similar effects were evident at the other types of institutions as well.

Among independent students, net costs declined as income increased for those enrolled in public 2-year institutions, again because most higher income students were enrolled part time (table 6). Net costs did not vary with income among independent students enrolled in private, not-for-profit 4-year institutions, but they did increase with income among those at 4-year public and private, not-for-profit institutions.

Thus far, net costs have been defined as total costs less total financial aid; however, there are many different ways net costs can be defined, depending upon what is being measured. For example, one might look at net costs as a measure of the total financial effort that students (and their families) make when paying for postsecondary education. In this case, it may make sense to calculate net costs by taking only grant aid into consideration (since this is the only type of aid that requires neither work nor repayment).

When net costs are defined as total costs less only grant aid received, net costs still increase with income among dependent students at each type of institution (table 7). But as one would expect given the data on the distribution of loan or work-study aid, the relative effects of excluding these aid types on net costs vary by type of institution. For example, net costs change very little at public 2-year institutions when loan and work-study aid are excluded, while the effects are more pronounced at the other institution types. The effects of excluding loan and work-study aid are especially large among dependent students from lower income families because of their greater reliance on financial aid.

The effects of excluding loans and work-study are also large among independent students. For example, net costs do not vary among independent students at private, not-for-profit 4-year institutions when all types of aid are included; however, when aid is restricted to grants, net costs decline with increases in income among these students. Net costs are positively associated with increases in income at 4-year public institutions when all types of aid are included in the net cost calculation, but they do not vary when only grants are considered. Again, lower income students are more reliant on loan and work-study aid, and when these discretionary forms of aid are excluded from the net cost calculation, their net costs rise relative to the net costs of students with higher incomes.

Net Costs Among Aided and Nonaided Students

Once financial aid is taken into account, how do the net costs of education compare among aided and nonaided undergraduates? Table 8 shows both average total costs and average net costs for aided and nonaided undergraduates. Note that the average net costs for nonaided students are the same as

total average costs (since there is no aid to “net” out), while net costs among aided students are defined here as total costs minus total financial aid.

In 1992–93, average total costs were higher among aided than nonaided undergraduates, mainly because a large majority of full-time, full-year students (the most costly enrollment pattern) received some type of financial aid. In other words, the difference in total costs is largely due to the different enrollment patterns of aided and nonaided students.²⁵ Once financial aid is taken into account, average net costs were similar for both aided (\$6,772) and nonaided (\$6,537) undergraduates. However, this pattern varied by type of institution. For example, aided students had higher net costs than nonaided students at public 2-year institutions (because full-time, full-year students were more likely than part-time or part-year students to receive aid), while aided students had lower average net costs at the other three institution types.²⁶


When net cost is defined as total cost less only grant aid, the net cost patterns for aided and nonaided students change substantially. Figure 4 displays average net costs for aided and nonaided students, excluding all forms of financial aid except grants. With the exception of private, not-for-profit 4-year institutions, where net costs remained higher among nonaided students, net costs were either the same or higher among aided than among nonaided students when loans and work-study were not considered. Thus, aided students reduced their net costs below those of nonaided students by taking

²⁶One reason why net costs were higher among nonaided than aided undergraduates in public 4-year; private, not-for-profit 4-year; and private, for-profit institutions is that students who did not receive financial aid were disproportionately drawn from the higher income groups. out loans or by working. These same options (less the federal subsidy) are also available to students who are not eligible for financial aid.

One puzzling question that is raised by these net cost comparisons is why net costs are more or less the same among aided and nonaided students enrolled in the same type of institution.²⁷ There is no obvious reason why these results would occur, and other things equal, one would expect nonaided students to have higher average net costs than aided students who are enrolled in the same type of institution. One plausible explanation, which is consistent with the findings of this study, is that students alter their behavior, seek financial aid, or do both, so that they can attend an institution that is consistent with their degree objectives and their willingness to pay. By this reasoning, net cost reflects the upper bounds of what students enrolled in each institution type are willing to pay; if they are willing to pay more, they choose to attend a more costly institution, enroll full time, or live away from home.

²⁷Net costs were not the same among aided and nonaided students whose enrollment status and institution type were the same, however. V. Conclusions

Discussions about the net cost of postsecondary education often revolve around student financial aid, primarily because enhancing access, choice, and persistence by reducing the net cost to students are the main goals of student financial aid. However, three-fifths of all undergraduates did not receive any financial aid in 1992–93, and among the two-fifths of undergraduates who did receive financial aid, the average amount of aid received was considerably less than half of the average total costs they incurred. Hence, most postsecondary costs were financed out of the resources of students and their families, and narrowly focusing on the effects of financial aid without considering the effects of students' decisions about where to enroll, whether to attend full time or part time, and whether to live on campus, off campus, or with parents or other relatives, ignores some of important ways in which students shape the net costs that they incur.

One important finding is that student financial aid reduced the variability of net costs among independent students at all income levels, and among dependent students whose parents had incomes up to about \$50,000. This occurred because students with lower incomes or from lower income families received more financial aid, on average, than did students with higher incomes or from higher income families. However, a closer look at net costs by both income and type of institution shows that while financial aid reduced the average costs incurred by students in each institution type, net costs increased with income among dependent students, regardless of the type of institution attended. Hence, the apparent equalizing effects of financial aid among dependent students from families with incomes under \$50,000 reflects not only the effects of financial aid but also the income distribution of students in the various institution types.

Among both dependent and independent students, those with lower incomes or from lower income backgrounds were more dependent on student financial aid than were higher income students and students from higher income backgrounds. Moreover, lower income students were substantially more dependent upon loans and work-study aid than their higher income peers.

Finally, the comparison of net costs among aided and nonaided students raises an interesting question: Why are the average net costs of these different groups about the same when they attend similar institutions? One interpretation is that net costs represent the upper bounds of what students who enroll in a particular type of institution are willing to pay. If this is right, one would expect to find that aided and nonaided students exhibited different enrollment behaviors; otherwise, nonaided students would have higher average net costs than aided students. In fact, aided undergraduates were more likely than nonaided undergraduates to be full-time, full-year students, while nonaided undergraduates were more likely than aided undergraduates to be part-time or part-year students. At the same time, the fact that receipt of aid is associated with more intensive postsecondary attendance patterns underlines the importance of financial aid. Thus, what students and their families ultimately pay for undergraduate education—their net costs—reflects not only the receipt of financial aid but also the institutions, attendance patterns, and living arrangements they choose.

Table Compendium

This compendium of tables illustrates the level of detail that can be achieved in an analysis using the NPSAS:93 data as well as the broad scope of the information in the NPSAS:93 files. The tables presented here are intended to provide an overview of student financing of undergraduate education. Many topics are not addressed, and some of the ones that are could profitably be explored in greater detail than was possible in this report. However, these tables do address many of the most common concerns about student financing of undergraduate education, and provide a starting point for more detailed analyses.

Four topics are summarized in the tables in this compendium: student demographics, the costs of postsecondary education, the distribution of financial aid, and the net costs of postsecondary education. In addition, each of these four sections is prefaced by a series of bullets that highlight the findings of the section.

Section 1

Demographic Characteristics

Dependency Status

- C Slightly more than 46 percent of all undergraduates were considered financially dependent for financial aid purposes, while 32 percent were independent with dependents of their own and the remaining 21 percent of all students were independent without dependents. The distribution of undergraduates by age reflects the distribution of students by dependency status, since all students over 24 years of age are defined as financially independent for aid eligibility, and only a minority (13 percent) of those under 24 met the criteria for financial independence. (table 1.1)
- C Institutions with longer programs of study were more likely to enroll dependent students than were less-than-4-year institutions. (table 1.1) Half of all students at less-than-2-year institutions were financially independent and had dependents of their own. In fact, students at less-than-2-year institutions were more likely to be independents with dependents than to not have dependents or be financially dependent themselves. (table 1.5)
- C Dependency status varied with institutional control. Students at private not-for-profit institutions were more likely to be dependents than those at other types of institutions. Seventy percent of enrollees in private for-profit institutions were financially independent. (table 1.1)
- C Dependency status was also related to attendance patterns. Nearly three out of four undergraduates who attended school full-time for the entire 1992–93 school year were financially dependent. Undergraduates who were independent with dependents, on the other hand, were more likely to attend part-time than full-time for either all or part of the year, and to attend for only part of the school year (either as full- or part-time students) than to attend throughout the school year. (table 1.1)

Attendance Status

- C About 46 percent of all undergraduates enrolled during the 1992–93 academic year attended school full-time for any part of the year. For independent students, attendance status was related to income. As income increased, independent students were less likely to attend full-time for the entire year, and more likely to enroll only part-time for part of the year. (table 1.1)
- C Attendance patterns were also related to level and control of the institution. Undergraduates in private, not-for-profit institutions were more likely than those in public or private for-profit institutions to attend full-time throughout the year. Also, students in 4-or-more year institutions were more likely than those in less-than-4-year institutions to attend full-time throughout the year. (table 1.1)

Residence

- Ⓒ In the 1992–93 academic year over half of all undergraduates lived off-campus (59 percent). Students at private not-for-profit institutions (who were more likely to be dependent) were less likely than those at public and private, for-profit institutions to live off-campus and more likely to live on-campus. Students at 4-year institutions were more likely to live on-campus, and less likely to live off-campus or with their parents than those at less-than-4-year institutions. (table 1.1)

Race-Ethnicity

- Ⓒ The racial distribution of undergraduates varied by institution type. White students were more likely to attend public or private not-for-profit institutions than private for-profit ones, while black students were more likely to attend private for-profit institutions than public or private not-for-profit institutions. The same pattern was reflected by institution level: white students were most likely to attend 2-year-or-more schools, while black students were most likely to attend less-than-2-year institutions (most private for-profits are less than 2 years (see table 1.5).²⁸ (table 1.2)

Gender

- Ⓒ Overall, more undergraduates were women than men. Older undergraduates in particular were more likely to be women than men. As the age of undergraduates increased, the proportion of women in each age group also increased. (table 1.2)
- Ⓒ Male and female undergraduates' attendance patterns varied by the length of the longest program offered at an institution. Females were more likely to attend less-than-2-year institutions than 2–year or more, while males more often attended 2-year or 4-year institutions than less-than-2-year ones. (table 1.2)

Income

- Ⓒ Student and family income were both associated with institutional control. Both dependent and independent students at lower income levels were more likely to enroll in private for-profit institutions than public or private not-for-profit institutions. At the upper income levels, however, patterns for independent and dependent students diverged. Dependent students were most likely to attend a private not-for-profit, while independent students with higher incomes were equally likely to attend a private not-for-profit as a public institution. (tables 1.3 and 1.4)

²⁸This may be in large part the result of the correlation between race and income: as income increased, a greater proportion of undergraduates were white and a smaller proportion black (see table 1.3). Lower income students were more likely to attend private for-profit institutions. (table 1.2)

Institution Level and Control

- Ⓒ Only 6 percent of all undergraduates attended an institution whose longest course lasted less than two years. The remaining students were about evenly divided between 2-year institutions and 4-year institutions. Three quarters of all undergraduates attended public institutions; these were most likely to be 2-year institutions. (table 1.5)

- Ⓒ As the level of parent's education increased, the likelihood of an undergraduate attending a 4-year institution also increased. Similarly, the likelihood of an undergraduate's attending a private not-for-profit institution increased with parent's education level. (table 1.5)

Total Costs of Attendance

- ⌄ The amount charged by an institution for tuition and fees varied by level and control of the institution. For example, the average tuition and fees was \$597 at a public 2-year institution, \$6,569 at a private not-for-profit nondoctoral institution, and \$4,409 at a private for-profit less-than-2-year (table 2.2a). Total costs of attendance at these same institution types were \$5,221, \$12,958, and \$10,664, respectively. (table 2.1a)
- ⌄ Average total costs of postsecondary attendance varied substantially by intensity of enrollment. Undergraduates enrolled full-time throughout the 1992–93 academic year reported total costs of attendance twice as high on average as students who were enrolled part-time, or full-time for only part of the year. (tables 2.1b and 2.1c)
- ⌄ Costs of attendance were largely determined by tuition patterns, which increased with income for dependents but decreased with higher income for independents. The difference between dependent and independent students' costs may be explained by the tendency for higher income dependent students to enroll in more expensive institutions, and for higher income independent students to enroll part-time. (table 2.2a)
- ⌄ The composition of total costs varied by attendance status. Among full-time, full-year undergraduates, tuition and fees accounted for 37 percent of total costs (tables 2.1b and 2.2b). For part-time or part-year undergraduates, average tuition and fees made up less than one-fourth of the total costs of attendance. (tables 2.1c and 2.2c)
- ⌄ The rate of tuition charged by postsecondary institutions varied by the intensity of students' enrollment at all institution types. At public 2-year institutions, for example, tuition for full-time/full-year undergraduates averaged \$1,282, whereas part-time or part-year students were charged an average \$474 for tuition and fees. (tables 2.2b and 2.2c)

Section 3

Characteristics of Financial Aid

All Types and Sources of Aid

- Ⓒ Four of every ten undergraduates received financial aid during the 1992–93 academic year. One-third received grants, while one in five took out a loan. (table 3.1a)
- Ⓒ As total cost of attendance increased for undergraduates, the percentage receiving any financial aid also increased. In particular, the proportion of undergraduates who received grants and loans rose with the cost of attendance. (table 3.1a)

Federal Aid

- Ⓒ About one in three undergraduates got federal financial aid during the 1992–93 school year. Federal aid was disbursed primarily in the form of grants. The second most common type of federal aid was student loans, with only about 3 percent receiving work-study and 3 percent receiving other federal aid. (table 3.2a)
- Ⓒ Dependent students, independent students without dependents and independent students with dependents were all about equally likely to be awarded federal financial aid. The type of aid received, however, varied by dependency status. Independent students were more likely to be awarded grants, while a higher percentage of dependent than independent students received work-study. (table 3.2a)
- Ⓒ For aided undergraduates, student loans from any source made up the largest average dollar amount of any type of aid disbursed. (see table 3.1b) Average dollar amounts of federal aid, on the other hand, were as large for “other” types of aid (including PLUS loans) as for student loans. (table 3.2b)
- Ⓒ Among undergraduates who received any financial aid, three out of four were awarded some type of federal aid. The amount of aid awarded varied by attendance pattern. The average amount of federal aid received by aided undergraduates overall was \$3,567. Consistent with higher costs for full-time attendance, full-time full-year students were awarded federal aid in amounts an average of about \$1,000 higher than part-time or part-year students. (table 3.2c)
- Ⓒ The percentage of undergraduates receiving federal aid varied by control and level of the institution they attended. Students at private for-profit institutions were more likely to receive federal aid than those at public or private not-for-profit institutions. Those at less-than-2-year institutions were more likely than students at 2-year or 4-year institutions to receive federal aid. (table 3.2d)

- C Average dollar amounts of federal financial aid received by undergraduates also varied by institution control and level. In general, undergraduates who attended more expensive institutions received larger aid amounts: an average of \$4501 at private not-for-profits versus \$3,101 at public institutions, for example. Undergraduates at 4-year institutions received the largest average dollar amounts of federal aid, while those at 2-year institutions (mostly community colleges) received the least. (table 3.2e)

State Aid

- C About one in ten undergraduates received some form of state-sponsored financial aid, or one third the number who received federal aid (see table 3.2a). As with federal aid, grants were the most common type of state-sponsored aid awarded. (table 3.3a)
- C The average dollar amount of state aid received by those students who were awarded state aid was \$1,371, or about one-third that of the average federal award (see table 3.2b). Like federal financial aid awards (see table 3.2a), the largest dollar amounts of aid were awarded as loans, though fewer than one percent of all undergraduates received state loans (see table 3.3a). (table 3.3b)
- C The proportion of students receiving state aid and the amount awarded varied by institutional control. Students at private for-profit institutions were less likely than those at public or private not-for-profits to receive state aid, though they were most likely to receive federal aid (see table 3.2d). Undergraduates at private not-for-profit institutions were most likely to receive state financial aid, with 18 percent of students at these institutions awarded state money.(table 3.3c) Similar to federal financial aid allocation, students at private institutions received larger dollar amounts of state aid than those at public institutions. (table 3.3d)
- C The proportion of students receiving state financial aid also varied by level of institution attended, and again state money was allocated differently than federal aid. While students at less-than-2-year institutions were most likely to receive federal aid, only 3 percent of students at less-than-2-year institutions received state aid, compared to 7 percent of 2-year students and 15 percent of 4-year students (table 3.3c). However, the 3 percent of students who attended less-than-2-year institutions and received state aid also received larger dollar amounts, on average, than students at 2-year or 4-year institutions (table 3.3d). Overall, 44 percent of state aid went to students at public 2-year schools, 31 percent went to public 4-year schools, and the rest was about evenly disbursed over the other institution types.

Institutional Aid

- C One in ten undergraduates received financial aid from the institution they attended. As with federal and state aid, the most common type of institutional aid was a grant (table 3.4a). Grants were also the type of aid disbursed in the largest amounts by institutions, compared to federal and state aid, which was disbursed in greater amounts as loans than as grants (see tables 3.2c and 3.3b). (table 3.4b)

- Ⓒ The proportion of students receiving institutional aid varied widely across institutional control. One third of all undergraduates at private not-for-profit institutions received grants from their institution, while only 8 percent of those who attended public institutions and 4 percent of private for-profit students received institutional grants (table 3.4a). Average dollar amounts of aid also varied, with the average private not-for-profit award more than twice that of private for-profit or public institutions. (table 3.4d)

Aid Packaging

- Ⓒ Undergraduates received various combinations of financial aid types. Overall, students were most likely to receive only grants: 40 percent of aid recipients received grants as their only form of financial aid and an additional 25 percent combined a grant with a loan. (table 3.5a)

Section 4

Net Costs and Remaining Need

Net Costs

- C Although both the percentage of students receiving financial aid and the average amount of aid received increased with the costs of postsecondary education (tables 3.1a and 3.1c), the net costs to students also increased. The net costs to students whose total costs were \$16,000 or more were \$16,343 on average in 1992–93, while those whose total costs were less than \$4,000 faced net costs of \$2,081 on average. Thus, even with financial aid, students who chose to attend a higher-cost institution paid more money out of pocket on average than did those who chose a lower-cost institution. (table 4.1a)

Expected Family Contribution

- C Unlike net costs, the expected family contribution was not directly related to total costs, largely because average EFC did not vary among students whose average total costs ranged from less than \$4,000 to between \$8,000 and \$11,999. However, the expected family contribution did increase with costs among students whose attendance-adjusted total costs were \$12,000 or more. (table 4.2)
- C The expected family contribution increased in direct relation to the students' parents' level of educational attainment. This is the relationship one would expect to find since both EFC and parents' education are good proxies for income. (table 4.2)

Financial Need Before and After Receipt of Aid

- C Among dependent students from families with incomes of less than \$10,000, 95 percent of students had financial need, compared to about 7 percent of students from families with incomes of \$100,000 or more. (table 4.3a)
- C The percentage of undergraduates with financial need prior to receipt of aid varied by race–ethnicity. About 73 percent of blacks had financial need, compared to 57 percent of whites. However, the average levels of need among blacks and whites was about the same. (tables 4.3a and 4.3b)
- C A smaller percentage of students in all racial–ethnic groups (except American Indian) had financial need after receipt of financial aid than prior to receiving aid. Furthermore, average remaining need was between \$2,000 and \$3,000 less after receipt of aid than before receipt of aid among all racial and ethnic groups. (tables 4.3a, 4.4a, 4.3b and 4.4c)
- C The percentage of undergraduates with financial need did not vary much by parents' education prior to receipt of financial aid, ranging from 50 percent of those whose parents had an

advanced degree to 58 percent of those whose parents had a high school diploma or some postsecondary education. However, the average amount of need was slightly higher among students whose parents had an advanced degree than among those whose parents had not completed a bachelor's degree. (tables 4.3a and 4.3b)

- C The percentage of students with financial need prior to receipt of financial aid increased with the total costs of education, ranging from an average of 26 percent of students whose total costs were less than \$4,000 to 86 percent of students whose total costs were \$16,000 or more. Likewise, the average amount of need prior to receipt of aid increased with costs, ranging from an average of \$2,855 among students whose total costs were less than \$4,000 to \$11,053 among students whose total costs were \$16,000 or more. (tables 4.3a and 4.3b)
- C The same patterns of need were evident by total costs after receipt of aid as well. However, the effects of aid on the percentage of students with need were more pronounced among students in the highest cost category than among those in the lowest cost category: the percentage of students with need fell by 5 percentage points among those whose costs were less than \$4,000 (from 26 to 21 percent), compared to a decline of 12 percentage points among those whose costs were more than \$16,000 (from 86 to 74 percent).

Glossary

This glossary describes the variables used in this report. It is organized into three sections: student background characteristics, student financial aid-related characteristics, and institutional characteristics. Within each section, variables are described in alphabetical order. The variables were taken directly from the NPSAS:93 Undergraduate Data Analysis System (DAS), an NCEs software application that generates tables from the NPSAS:93 data. A description of the DAS software can be found in appendix B. The labels in parentheses correspond to the names of the variables in the DAS.

Student Characteristics

Age as of 12/31/92 (AGE)

23 years old or younger	Student was 23 years or younger as of 12/31/92.
24–29 years old	Student was between 24 and 29 years old as of 12/31/92.
30 years old or older	Student was 30 years old or older as of 12/31/92.
40 years old or older	Student was 40 years old or older as of 12/31/92.

Attendance pattern (ATTNSTAT)

Attendance pattern describes the student's full- or part-time attendance while enrolled as defined by the institution, and the number of months a student was enrolled during the year. Students were considered to have been enrolled for a full year if they were enrolled at least 9 months between July 1992 and June 1993.

Full-time, full-year	Students enrolled full time for the full year at one or more institutions.
Full-time, part-year	Students enrolled full time less than 9 months and never attended part time.
Part-time and/or part-year	Student enrolled part time only for the duration of enrollment, or a combination of full time and part time for the duration of enrollment.

Student: Citizenship (CTZNSHP2)

U.S. Citizenship	Student had U.S. citizenship in 1992–93.
Noncitizen	Student was not a U.S. citizen in 1992–93; includes permanent residents and others eligible for financial aid.
Other	Student was neither of the above (includes those holding a student or exchange visitor visas).

Dependency status in 1992 (DEPEND)

Dependency status is determined primarily for evaluating financial aid eligibility. If a student is considered financially dependent, the student's parents' assets and income are considered in determining aid eligibility. If the student is financially independent, only the student's assets are considered, regardless of the relationship between student and parent.

Undergraduate students were considered independent if 1) the institution reported that they were independent, or 2) they met one of the following criteria:

- Ⓒ The student was 24 or older as of 12/31/92;
- Ⓒ The student was a veteran;
- Ⓒ The student was an orphan or ward of the court;
- Ⓒ The student had legal dependents, other than spouse; or
- Ⓒ The student was married, and not claimed by parents in 1992.

Dependency status for financial aid (DEPEND2)

Based upon DEPEND, students were divided into those who were dependent, independent without dependents of their own, and independent with dependents of their own.

Dependent	Student was considered financially dependent for financial aid purposes in 1992–93.
Independent without dependents	Student was considered financially independent for financial aid purposes and had no dependents.
Independent with dependents	Student was considered financially independent for financial aid purposes and had dependents. Spouses were considered dependents.

Income and dependency level (INCOME)

The source of income for independent students is their own assets or earnings, including those of their spouse if they are married. The source of income for dependent students is their parents' assets or earnings. Incomes in NPSAS:93 were derived from three sources: institutional records, parental reports, and student reports (in priority order).

Advanced degree	One or both parents earned an advanced degree including a master's degree, Ph.D., M.D., etc.

Parents total income, percentile rank by quartile (dependent students) (PCTDEP)

Percentile rank of parents' total income. Calculated for dependent students only. Dependent students were ranked on the basis of their parents' income from lowest to highest. This distribution was then divided into four equal groups, with students assigned to the appropriate group given their parents' income.

Lowest quartile	Students whose parents' income ranked in the lowest 25 percent of the dependent student income distribution.
Middle two quartiles	Students whose parents' income ranked between 26 percent and 75 percent of the dependent student income distribution.
Highest quartile	Students whose parents' income ranked in the top 25 percent of the dependent student income distribution.

Independent student total income, percentile rank by quartile (PCTINDEP)

Percentile rank of independent student's total income. Calculated for independent students only. Independent students were ranked on the basis of their own and their spouses' income from lowest to highest. This distribution was then divided into four equal groups, with students assigned to the appropriate group given their own and their spouses' income.

Lowest quartile Students whose income ranked in the lowest 25 percent of the independent student income distribution.

Middle two quartiles Students whose income ranked between 26 percent and 75 percent of the independent student income distribution.

Highest quartile Students whose income ranked in the top 25 percent of the independent student income distribution.

Race-ethnicity (RACE)

Asian/Pacific Islander A person having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East, Southeast Asia, the Indian Subcontinent, or the Pacific Islands.

Black, Non-Hispanic A person having origins in any of the black racial groups of Africa, not of Hispanic origin.

Hispanic A person of Mexican, Puerto Rican, Cuban, Central or South American, or other Spanish culture or origin, regardless of race.

American Indian/
Alaskan Native A person having origins in any of the original peoples of North America and who maintains cultural identification through tribal affiliation or community recognition.

White, Non-Hispanic A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Europe, North Africa, or the Middle East (except those of Hispanic origin).

Undergraduate class level (YEAR_R)

Year in school. A function of level determined from institutional data for first and last term, year in college from financial aid forms, student-reported data for first and last term, or sampling stratum.

Freshman (1st year undergrad)	Student's level was freshman or first year.
Sophomore (2nd year undergrad)	Student's level was sophomore or second year.
Junior (3rd year undergrad)	Student's level was junior or third year.
Senior (4th/5th year undergrad)	Student's level was senior or fourth/fifth year.
Undergraduate (level unknown)	Student's undergraduate level was unknown.

Financial Aid Characteristics

Funds, aid package (AIDPACK)

Packages by types of aid: grants, loans, and other types of aid. For students with any aid, records or combinations of aid from grants, loans, work-study, or other aid sources.

Grant, loan, and work-study	Student received grant, loan, and work-study aid.

Expected family contribution (EFC4)

The expected family contribution is the amount estimated by the Congressional Methodology formula that a student and/or a student's family should be able to pay based upon income, assets, family size, and the number of children enrolled in postsecondary education. EFC4 includes data from institutional sources for those who applied for aid, as well as imputed values for nonaided students. EFC4 is recorded as a continuous variable in the file.

Institutional grant amount (INGRTAMT)

Specifies the total amount of institutional grant aid received by a student in 1992–93. Positive values on this variable were also used to identify the percentage of students who received this category of aid.

Institutional loan amount (INLNAMT)

Specifies the total amount of institutional loan aid received by a student in 1992–93. Positive values on this variable were also used to identify the percentage of students who received this category of aid.

Institutional other aid—includes assistantships (INOTHAMT)

Amount of institutional aid received by a student in 1992–93 that could be classified as grants, loans, or work-study (including teaching and research assistantships). Positive values on this variable were also used to identify the percentage of students who received this category of aid.

Institutional total aid amount (INSTAMT)

Amount of all institutional aid received by a student in 1992–93, including grants, loans, work-study and other types of awards. Positive values on this variable were also used to identify the percentage of students who received this category of aid.

Institutional work-study amount (INSTCWS)

Total amount of all institutionally sponsored work-study awards, institutionally funded college work-study, plus any other institutionally funded work-study received by a student in 1992–93. Positive values on this variable were also used to identify the percentage of students who received this category of aid.

Institutional nonneed-based grants (INSTNOND)

Amount of institutional grants and scholarships received by a student in 1992–93 that were based entirely on merit, including athletic scholarships and nonneed tuition waivers. Positive values on this variable were also used to identify the percentage of students who received this category of aid.

Remaining need-adjusted student budget minus expected family contribution (SNEED3)

Calculated for all students whether or not they applied for or received any aid. Negative values set to zero.

Remaining need-adjusted student budget minus expected family contribution minus total aid (SNEED5)

Calculated for all students whether or not they applied for or received any aid. Negative values set to zero.

Total federal aid amount (TFEDAID)

Total amount of aid received by a student in 1992–93 from all federal aid programs. Positive values on this variable were also used to identify the percentage of students who received this category of aid.

Total federal grant amount (TFEDGRT)

Total amount of federal grants received by a student in 1992–93. Positive values on this variable were also used to identify the percentage of students who received this category of aid.

Total federal loan amount (except PLUS) (TFEDLN)

Total amount of federal loans received by a student in 1992–93, excluding loans to parents— Parent Loans to Undergraduate Students (PLUS). Positive values on this variable were also used to identify the percentage of students who received this category of aid.

Other type federal amount (including PLUS) (TFEDOTHR)

Total amount of all federal amounts that could not be classified as grants, loans, or work-study. Includes PLUS loans and graduate assistantships. Positive values on this variable were also used to identify the percentage of students who received this category of aid.

Total federal work-study amount earned (TFEDWRK)

Total amount of federal work-study earned by a student in 1992–93. Positive values on this variable were also used to identify the percentage of students who received this category of aid.

Total aid amount (TOTAID)

Total amount of financial aid received by a student in 1992–93 from any source (federal, state, institution, other). Includes grants, loans, or work-study, as well as loans under the PLUS program. Students receiving aid were identified by the TOTAID variable having a positive value.

Total grant amount (TOTGRT)

Total amount of grant aid received by a student in 1992–93 from any source (federal, state, institution, other). Grants are a type of student financial aid that does not require repayment or employment. At the undergraduate level it is usually (but not always) awarded on the basis of need, possibly combined with some skills or characteristics the student possesses. Grants are more frequently awarded on a merit basis at the graduate level. Grants include scholarships and fellowships. The percentage of students with grants is the percentage with positive amounts recorded for this variable.

Total student loan amount (TOTLOAN)

Total amount of loan aid received by a student in 1992–93. This includes all loans through federal, state, or institutional programs except PLUS loans (which are made to parents). Loans are a type of student financial aid that advances funds and that are evidenced by a promissory note requiring the recipient to repay the specified amounts under prescribed conditions. The percentage of students with loans is the percentage with positive amounts recorded for this variable.

Total other type of aid and assistantships (includes PLUS) (TOTOTHR)

Total of aid amounts received by students in 1992–93 that could not be classified as grants, loans, or work-study. Includes teaching and research assistantships, PLUS loans, and veterans' benefits. Positive values on this variable were also used to identify the percentage of students who received this category of aid.

Total work-study amount (TOTWKST)

Total amount of work-study aid received by students in 1992–93. Work-study programs provide partial reimbursement of wages paid to students. They may be sponsored by the federal or state governments or by the institution. The percentage of students with work-study is the percentage with positive amounts recorded for this variable.

Total state aid amount (STATEAMT)

Total amount of state aid received by a student in 1992–93. State aid included state-based grants, loans, work-study, and other state-based awards. Positive values on this variable were also used to identify the percentage of students who received this category of aid.

State nonneed-based grant/scholarship amount (STATNOND)

Amount of state grants received by a student in 1992–93 that were based on merit alone. Positive values on this variable were also used to identify the percentage of students who received this category of aid.

State grant total amount (STGTAMT)

Amount of state grant/scholarships and fellowship/traineeships, including the federal portion of State Student Incentive Grants (SSIG) received by a student in 1992–93. Positive values on this variable were also used to identify the percentage of students who received this category of aid.

State loan total amount (STLNAMT)

Total amount of state loans received by a student in 1992–93. Positive values on this variable were also used to identify the percentage of students who received this category of aid.

Other type of state amount (STOTHAMT)

Amount of state aid received by a student in 1992–93 that could not be classified as grants, loans, or work-study. Includes teaching and research assistantships. Positive values on this variable were also used to identify the percentage of students who received this category of aid.

State work-study total amount (STWKAMT)

Total amount of state work study received by a student in 1992–93. Positive values on this variable were also used to identify the percentage of students who received this category of aid.

Institutional Characteristics

Institution type (CONTROL)

Source of revenue and control of operations.

Public	A postsecondary education institution operated by publicly elected or appointed officials in which the program and activities are under the control of these officials and which is supported primarily by public funds.
Private, not-for-profit	A postsecondary institution that is controlled by an independent governing board and incorporated under section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code.
Private, for-profit	A postsecondary institution that is privately owned and operated as a profit-making enterprise. Includes career colleges and proprietary institutions.

Level of institution (LEVEL)

The net cost variables are intended to measure the remaining costs of attendance after various types of aid have been taken into account. NETCST5 takes all grants into account.

Adjusted cost minus federal grants (NETCST9)

The net cost variables are intended to measure the remaining costs of attendance after various types of aid have been taken into account. NETCST9 takes all federal grants into account.

Institutional type (level and control) (SECTOR_B)

Institution type by level and control, combined. Institution level concerns the institution's highest offering (length of program and type of certificate, degree, or award), and control concerns the source of revenue and control of operations.

[room and board charges if the student lived on campus] If the student attended full-time/full-year, this represents the full average monthly household expenses times the number of months enrolled. If the student was enrolled less than full-time/full-year, the student-reported average monthly household costs were set equal to 75% during months attending half time but less than full-time, and set equal to 25% during months that the student attended less than half time.

Tuition and fees (TUIITION)

Actual amount of tuition charged the student for the terms attended, as reported by the institution. The student report was used if institutional data were not available or if the student attended more than one institution during the academic year.

Technical Notes and Methodology

The 1992–93 National Postsecondary Student Aid Study (NPSAS:93)

The need for a nationally representative database on postsecondary student financial aid prompted the U.S. Department of Education to conduct the National Postsecondary Student Aid Study, a survey conducted every three years beginning in 1987. The NPSAS sample was designed to include students enrolled in all types of postsecondary education. Thus, it included students enrolled in public institutions; private, not-for-profit institutions; and private, for-profit institutions. The sample included students at 4-year and 2-year institutions, as well as students enrolled in occupationally specific programs that lasted for less than 2 years.

The NPSAS:93 analysis file included a stratified sample of approximately 66,000 eligible students (about 52,000 of whom were undergraduates) from about 1,100 institutions. Students were included in the sample if they attended a NPSAS-eligible institution; were enrolled between July 1, 1992 and June 30, 1993; and were enrolled in one or more courses or programs including courses for credit, a degree or formal award program of at least 3 months* duration, or an occupationally or vocationally specific program of at least 3 months* duration. Regardless of their postsecondary status, however, students who were also enrolled in high school were excluded. In addition, all students who received a baccalaureate degree between July 1, 1992 and June 30, 1993 were included and used as the base sample for the NPSAS:93 longitudinal component survey (Baccalaureate and Beyond).

For each of the students included in the NPSAS sample, there were up to three sources of data. First, institution registration and financial aid records were extracted. Second, a Computer Assisted Telephone Interview (CATI) was conducted with each student. Finally, a CATI designed for the parents or guardians of a subsample of students was conducted. Data from these three sources were synthesized into a single system with an overall response rate of about 85 percent. (Table B.1 shows response rates for students in each type of institution.) For example, the variable age was determined by first checking student responses. If a student did not provide this information, age was taken from the institutional record abstract.

Description of Financial Aid Programs

There are three main types of student financial aid: grants, loans, and work study. Each of these three types of aid can be awarded as need-based aid—that is, after taking into account the financial need of the recipient—on the basis of scholastic merit, or on some other basis—such as football scholarships or awards from the local chamber of commerce for civic participation.

Virtually all financial aid comes from one of three sources: the federal government, state governments, or the postsecondary institution in which the student is enrolled. Other sources of aid include philanthropic organizations, foundations, employers, and local governments or community organizations.

In general, most grants are awarded as need-based aid. Merit-based grants such as academic scholarships are important, particularly at the institutional level, but the largest grant program in 1992–93—the federal Pell Grant program—awarded aid to students on the basis of financial need. Like grant aid, loans for postsecondary education can be either need-based or nonneed-based. Also like most grant programs, most loan programs that offered financial aid to undergraduates in 1992–93 were need-based. The largest programs, the federal Stafford and Perkins loan programs, enable students to borrow money at relatively low rates of interest (because the interest payments are subsidized by the government) and to defer payment of any principal and interest until after completing their education. Other, non-subsidized loans are available through the federal PLUS and Supplemental Loans for Students (SLS) programs; these loans are nonneed-based, but are subject to the restriction that the loan funds, in combination with the other resources available, cannot exceed the total costs of education. The third major type of financial aid is “work-study,” which is typically a campus administered program that make use of federal funds to subsidize employment for students with financial need. Although most work-study aid comes from federal sources, many states and institutions also provide funds to support work-study programs.¹

Of the three major types of financial aid, subsidized loans accounted for the largest share of student financial aid in 1992–93, followed by grants (table B.2). Within each of type of aid, the federal government was the source of the majority of student aid, followed by institutions and then states (except in the relatively small work-study and “other” categories).

Financial aid of different types and from different sources is often combined to form a financial aid “package.” There are a variety of reasons for packaging aid. One reason is that the supply of grants, the most desirable form of financial aid, is limited, and in order to spread the benefits of grant aid more widely, the size of individual grants must also be limited. For example, in 1992–93 the maximum federal Pell Grant available to students with financial need was \$2,400, or 60 percent of costs, whichever was less. Since financial need for most aid recipients was well in excess of the Pell Grant limits, resources from more than one source were required. Packaging is a complex issue, and cannot be examined in any detail here. For this study, the important point is that undergraduate students must often obtain different types of financial aid from several different sources, and most aid recipients will have received grants, many will also have received loans, and some may also have received work-study aid.

Measurement of Costs

There are several ways in which the costs of postsecondary education are typically measured. Financial aid is generally awarded on the basis of estimated standard budgets that are constructed by a postsecondary institution to reflect the average costs of the major components of education at that institution. These components are generally defined as tuition and fees, room and board, books and supplies, and other (which includes such things as transportation and child care expenses). The budgets are typically adjusted to reflect enrollment status (tuition and fees are often lower for part-time students), whether the student lives on- or off-campus or with parents, dependency status, number of dependents, and a variety of other characteristics.²

Except for tuition and fees, the cost data in this report are student-reported costs, which are more sensitive to each student’s unique situation than are the institutional budgets.³ The problem with student-reported costs, however, is that they are substantially affected by decisions and events that are within the student’s control. For example, a student may choose to live off campus rather than on campus in student housing, or may choose to attend part time rather than full time, and both of these decisions have large cost implications. Another problem with student-reported costs is in estimating in-kind contributions from parents, relatives, or employers. For example, among independent students expenses may often include support for (or by) other family members: how much of the car or housing costs incurred by a married student with children can be attributed to postsecondary education? Finally, students may have inflated expectations with respect to their needs for entertainment or recreation, and even if these must be supported out of the student’s own pocket, they are hard to justify as direct costs of postsecondary education.

²Of these characteristics, dependency status may well be the most important. Although dependency status is primarily a financial aid issue—once independent, only the student’s income and assets are considered in the need analysis—dependency status is also highly correlated with age, and older students exhibit quite different enrollment patterns and behaviors than do younger students. Despite the methodological differences between the institutional budgets and the average student reported costs, and the results of this analysis would not be any different if the budgeted costs were used.⁴

Distribution of Students

Because the distribution of students in the various institution types has a significant impact on the average values reported here, table B.3 shows the distribution of students by a variety of characteristics (page 187). These weighted distributions correspond to the variables that appear in table 1.1 of the compendium.

Accuracy of Estimates

The statistics in this report are estimates derived from a sample. Two broad categories of error occur in such estimates: sampling and nonsampling errors. Sampling errors happen because observations are made only on samples of students, not on entire populations. Non-sampling errors occur not only in sample surveys but also in complete censuses of entire populations. A representative table of standard errors is presented in table B.4 (page 188).

Nonsampling errors can be attributed to a number of sources: inability to obtain complete information about all students in all institutions in the sample (some students or institutions refused to participate, or students participated but answered only certain items); ambiguous definitions; differences in interpreting questions; inability or unwillingness to give correct information; mistakes in recording or coding data; and other errors of collecting, processing, sampling, and estimating missing data.

Data Analysis System

The estimates presented in this report were produced from the NPSAS:93 undergraduate Data Analysis System (DAS). The DAS software makes it possible for users to specify and generate their own tables from postsecondary data sets. With the DAS, users can recreate or expand upon the tables presented in this report. In addition to the table estimates, the DAS calculates proper standard errors and weighted sample sizes for these estimates.⁵ For example, table B.4 presents the standard errors that

The method for computing sampling errors used by the DAS involves approximating the estimator by the linear terms of a Taylor series expansion. The procedure is typically referred to as the Taylor series method.

correspond to table 3.1 in the table compendium. If the number of valid cases is too small to produce an estimate (i.e., less than 30), the DAS prints the message “low-N” instead of the estimate.

In addition to tables, the DAS will also produce a correlation matrix of selected variables to be used for linear regression models. Included in the output with the correlation matrix are the design effects (DEFT) for all the variables identified in the matrix. Since statistical procedures generally compute regression coefficients based on simple random sample assumptions, the standard errors must be adjusted with the design effects to take into account the NPSAS stratified sampling method.

Statistical Procedures

The 1992–93 NPSAS survey, while representative and statistically accurate, was not a simple random sample. Instead, the survey sample was selected using a more complex three-step procedure with stratified samples and differential probabilities of selection at each level. First, postsecondary institutions were initially selected within geographical strata. Once institutions were organized by zip code and state, they were further stratified by control (i.e., public; private, not-for-profit; or private, for-profit) and offering (less-than-2-year, 2- to 3-year, 4-year non doctoral-granting, and 4-year doctoral-granting). Sampling rates for students enrolled at different institutions and levels (undergraduate or other) varied, resulting in better data for policy purposes, but at a cost to statistical efficiency.

The comparisons described in the report have all been tested for statistical significance to ensure that the differences are larger than those that might be expected due to sampling variation. Two types of comparisons have been made in the report as follows.

Differences in two estimated percentages. The paired comparisons were tested using student's *t* statistics. Comparisons based on the estimates of the proportions include the estimates of the probability of a Type I error, or significance level. The significance levels were determined by calculating the student's *t* values for the differences between each pair of means or proportions and comparing these with published tables of significance levels for two-tailed hypothesis testing. Student's *t* values may be computed for comparisons using these tables* estimates with the following formula:

$$t = \frac{P_1 \& P_2}{\sqrt{se_1^2 + se_2^2}}$$

where P_1 and P_2 are the estimates to be compared and se_1 and se_2 are their corresponding standard errors. Note that this formula is valid only for independent estimates. When the estimates were not independent (for example, when comparing the percentages across a percent distribution in this report (a row in a table), a covariance term was added to the denominator of the t -test formula).

There are hazards in reporting statistical tests for each comparison. First, the test may make comparisons based on large t statistics appear to merit special attention. This can be misleading since the magnitude of the t statistic is related not only to the observed differences in means or percentages but also to the number of students in the specific categories used for comparison. Hence, a small difference compared across a large number of students would produce a large t statistic.

A second hazard in reporting statistical tests for each comparison is making multiple comparisons among categories of an independent variable. For example, when making paired comparisons among different levels of income, the probability of a Type I error for these comparisons taken as a group is larger than the probability for a single comparison. When more than one difference between groups of related characteristics or “families” are tested for statistical significance, one must apply a standard that assures a level of significance for all of those comparisons taken together.

Comparisons were made in this report only when $p \# .05/k$ for a particular pairwise comparison, where that comparison was one of k tests within a family. This guarantees both that the individual comparison would have $p \# .05$ and that when k comparisons were made within a family of possible tests, the significance level of the comparisons would sum to $p \# .05$.⁶

For example, in a comparison of the percentages of males and females who enrolled in postsecondary education only one comparison is possible (males v. females). In this family, $k=1$, and the comparison can be evaluated with a Student’s t test. When students are divided into five racial-ethnic groups and all possible comparisons are made, then $k=10$ and the significance level of each test must be $p \# .05/10$, or $.005$. The formula for calculating family size (k) is as follows: $k = j * (j - 1)/2$, where j is the number of categories for the variable being tested. In the case of race–ethnicity, there are five racial–ethnic groups (American Indian, Asian, black, Hispanic, and white), so $k = 5*(5-1)/2=10$.

Trends. In several instances, pair-wise comparisons proved too cumbersome. For example, one would like to say something about the general relationship between the income level of dependent

undergraduate students (ten categories) and the amount of financial aid they received. Even if one were inclined to test all of the 45 possible pair-wise comparisons, not all of the possible comparisons are likely to be statistically significant, even though the data appear to suggest clear trends. In such cases, a weighted least squares regression formula was used to test whether the trend between parents' income and the amount of financial aid received was significant, even if all of the pair-wise comparisons were not.

This regression test for linearity was done in this analysis using the data manipulation and regression capabilities of the Microsoft EXCEL spreadsheet program. The input data for the regressions were the estimates and standard errors in the output tables created by the Data Analysis System. All of the variables included in the regression equations were transformed by dividing them by the standard error of the relevant proportion. An intercept variable was also created by dividing a column of 1s by the standard error of the corresponding proportion. The new dependent variable was then regressed on the new independent variable and the intercept variable. The statistical significance of beta for the independent variable was then evaluated in relation $p \neq 0.05$, or $t \neq 1.96$. One important limitation of this test is that it can only be used to assess trends across ordered variables or variable categories.
