INTRODUCTION

The National Postsecondary Student Aid Study (NPSAS) is a comprehensive study that examines how students and their families pay for postsecondary education, and describes other characteristics of students. It includes nationally representative samples of undergraduate, graduate, and first-professional students; students attending less-than-2-year, 2-year, 4-year, and doctorate-granting institutions; students who receive financial aid and those who do not receive aid.

This tabulation is based on information from about 48,300 undergraduate and graduate students enrolled during the 1995-96 year was collected at 836 postsecondary institutions. The sample represents about 16.7 million undergraduates, 2.4 million graduate and 320,000 first-professional students enrolled at any time between July 1, 1995 - June 30, 1996.¹

Estimates in this tabulation focus primarily on percentages of students receiving specified types of financial aid, and average amounts of specific types of financial aid received. Unless otherwise noted, all average amounts of aid described in the highlights and presented in the tables reflect the weighted means and are based only on the recipients of that source of aid.

ACCURACY OF THE ESTIMATES IN THIS TABULATION

The estimates in this tabulation are subject to sampling and nonsampling errors. Nonsampling errors are due to a number of sources, including but not limited to, nonresponse, inaccurate coding, misspecification of composite variables, and inaccurate imputations. Sampling errors exist in all sample-based data sets, including NPSAS. Estimates based on a sample may differ from those based on a different sample of the same underlying population. Thus, estimates of average aid amounts based on the NPSAS sample will probably differ from specific program amounts reported by the Department's program offices--which are typically based on a census.

The standard error is a measure of the precision of the estimate. In this tabulation, each estimate's standard error was calculated using Taylor residual procedures and can be produced using the 1996 NPSAS Data Analysis System software. Additional information including selected standard errors for the estimated percentages in Table 1 are presented in the Appendix. All differences reported in the Highlights were significant at the .05 level, using the Bonferroni procedure when appropriate. This assures both the individual comparison would have $p \le .05$ and that when multiple comparisons were made within a family of possible tests, the significance level of the comparisons would sum to $p \le .05$.

The procedure that computed the estimates in this tabulation required 30 or more unweighted cases. For those estimates with fewer than 30 unweighted cases, the cell was labeled as "low n." Readers are cautioned that "low n" should only be interpreted as "fewer than 30 cases were in the NPSAS analysis file to produce this estimate." That is, "low n" does not necessarily mean that a low number of students received the specific type of aid, or that the amount of aid received was low.

¹ Using this time period would have delayed final sampling for many institutions until the first 1996 summer session began. Therefore, the survey population was defined as those students who were enrolled in any term beginning between May 1, 1995 and April 30, 1996.

CAUTIONS AGAINST COMPARING THESE ESTIMATES TO PRIOR NPSAS ESTIMATES

Two design features of the 1996 NPSAS sample suggest that the estimates in this tabulation, while generally comparable to NPSAS:93, and NPSAS:90, are not comparable to published estimates from the 1987 NPSAS. These design changes were made beginning with the 1990 NPSAS to improve full-year estimates. The 1987, and 1990 NPSAS sampled students enrolled in the fall (October). However, the 1990 NPSAS also sampled students who were enrolled in summer (August), winter (February), and spring (June). In NPSAS:93 and NPSAS:96, institutions were asked to provide one list (if possible), that represented students enrolled at any time during the 1995-96 year. In each NPSAS survey, those students who were initially sampled in the fall could have been enrolled for the full academic year.

The 1990, 1993, and 1996 NPSAS samples also included a small sample of students from Puerto Rico. Students from Puerto Rico were not included in the 1987 NPSAS. The final restricted data files and the 1996 NPSAS Data Analysis System software will allow users to produce estimates comparable to 1987 by selecting only students who were enrolled in the fall and exclude those sampled from Puerto Rico. These estimates will reflect full-year amounts of aid for students who were enrolled in the fall. Such estimates, however, will not reflect total expenditures as reported by the Department's specific Title IV program offices. This will be explained more fully in the forthcoming methodology report.

OTHER CAUTIONARY NOTES

The estimates for average amounts in this tabulation are only for aid recipients who received the specified type of aid. For example, among Title IV aid recipients, dependent undergraduates with family incomes of \$100,000 or more, received an average Title IV award of \$6,560 (including PLUS loans). But among undergraduate Title IV aid recipients, about 2 percent came from families with incomes above \$100,000. Further, NCES recommends that readers not try to produce their own estimates such as the percentage of all students receiving aid or the numbers of undergraduates enrolled in the fall who received any aid, federal aid, state aid, etc., by combining estimates in this tabulation with the Center's Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) fall 1995 enrollment numbers. The IPEDS enrollment data are for fall enrollment only and include some students not eligible for NPSAS (for example, those enrolled in U.S. Service Academies, those taking college courses while enrolled in high school). Additional information on the NPSAS:96 sample will be described in the forthcoming methodology report.

ADDITIONAL ESTIMATES

All estimates in this tabulation were produced using software developed by NCES. The software includes more than 800 variables and allows users to produce tables or correlation matrices for use in regression analyses. Users can specify row and column variables to produce estimated means, percentages, standard errors, and weighted sample sizes. Estimates can be produced for specific subgroups--for example, aided, full-time, dependent students. Student Financing of Undergraduate Education, 1995-96

This report focuses on undergraduate students, and examines how undergraduate students enrolled in the 1995-96 financed their education. The report includes a section that explores undergraduate borrowing, including information from the National Student Loan Data System on cumulative borrowing. Other tables in the report include information on total costs of attendance, the distribution of financial aid among students by type of institution, and the net costs of attendance.

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HIGHLIGHTS

All estimates presented in this tabulation are based on students participating in the 1996 National Postsecondary Student Aid Study (NPSAS). The National Postsecondary Student Aid Study is a comprehensive study designed to describe characteristics of students, including how students and their families pay for postsecondary education. It includes nationally representative samples of undergraduate, graduate, and first-professional students; students attending less-than-2-year, 2-year, 4-year, and doctoral-granting institutions; students who receive financial aid as well as those who do not receive aid.

The estimates in this tabulation are based on more than 48,000 undergraduate and graduate students' information from institution financial aid and admissions records, and computer-assisted telephone interviews, and the Department of Education's administrative files. The sample represents about 16.7 million undergraduates, 2.4 million graduate and 320,000 first-professional students enrolled during 1995-96. Unless otherwise noted, all average amounts of aid described in the highlights and presented in the tables are based on recipients of that source of aid. Highlights are presented separately for undergraduates and graduate and first-professional students.

AMONG THE 16.7 MILLION UNDERGRADUATES (INCLUDING FULL-TIME AND PART-TIME STUDENTS) ENROLLED DURING 1995-96:

- Fifty percent of undergraduates (about 8.3 million) received some type of financial aid; averaging \$4,926 [Tables 1, 2].
- Overall, about three out of eight undergraduates (37 percent) received some type of federal aid [Table 3].
- Percentages of undergraduates receiving federal aid varied, depending on family income and the type of institution. Among dependent students, percentages ranged from about 63 percent of undergraduates from families with incomes less than \$20,000 to about 14 percent of undergraduates from families with incomes of \$100,000 or more. Among independent students, 59 percent of those with incomes less than \$10,000 received some federal financial aid [Table 3].
- The percentage of undergraduates receiving federal aid ranged from 16 percent of students at public less-than-2-year institutions to 71 percent of undergraduates enrolled at private for-profit, 2-year or higher institutions [Table 3].

- Forty-three percent of undergraduates at private not-for-profit 4-year institutions received some institutional aid, averaging about \$5,150. Sixteen percent of undergraduates at public 4-year institutions received some institutional aid, averaging about \$2,160 [Table 3, 4].
- Nearly 1 of every 5 dependent undergraduates (19 percent) came from families making less than \$20,000 [Table 5]. Among Title IV aid recipients who were dependent on their families for financial support, 30 percent had incomes less than \$20,000 [Table 6].
- One of every two independent undergraduates (52 percent) who received Title IV aid, had family incomes less than \$10,000 [Table 7].
- One of every five undergraduates (22 percent) received a federally subsidized Stafford loan, averaging \$3,114. One of every ten received an unsubsidized Stafford loan, averaging \$2,925 [Table 8, 9].
- Among the recipients enrolled in private not-for-profit, doctorate-granting institutions, the average Title IV loan amount was \$4,802. At private not-for-profit, non-doctorate-granting 4-year institutions, the average received was \$4,322 [Table 9].
- Fifty-two percent of students enrolled in private for-profit less-than-2-year institutions received a Title IV loan; the average received was \$3,857 [Table 8, 9].
- Among students enrolled full-time for the full year, 30 percent received a federal Pell grant, averaging \$1,776 [Table 10, 11].

AMONG THE 2.8 MILLION GRADUATE AND FIRST-PROFESSIONAL STUDENTS (INCLUDING FULL-TIME AND PART-TIME STUDENTS) ENROLLED DURING 1995-96:

- About one of every two graduate/first-professional students received some financial aid averaging \$9,814 [Table 13, 14].
- Overall, 25 percent received some institutional aid, averaging \$6,503; but this varied considerably depending on the type of program. Twenty-two percent of students in Master's degree programs compared to 42 percent of students in doctorate or first-professional degree programs received some institution aid [Table 13, 14].

TECHNICAL APPENDIX

A stratified sample of 973 postsecondary institutions was selected from all institutions listed in the 1993-94 Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) Institutional Characteristics (IC) data base. Institutions were selected with probabilities proportional to a composite measure of size based on expected numbers of enrollees in the four student-level sampling strata: potential first-time, beginning students; other undergraduate students; graduate students; and first-professional students. One-hundred thirty-one institutions had such large size measures that they were selected with certainty, and the remaining 842 sample institutions were selected with probabilities proportional to size from the nine institutional sampling strata shown in Table A-1. Out of the 900 NPSAS-eligible institutions, 836 sent enrollment lists/files. Table A-1 shows: the number of institutions sampled; the number eligible, the number agreeing initially to participate, and the number providing lists for sampling by sector.

Table A-2 shows the numbers of institutions that provided student level data from institutional records and the response rates by institutional strata. Table A-3 shows the overall student interview response rates for the two phases of telephone interviews, the total number interviewed and the weighted overall effective response rates for the computer assisted telephone interview. Additional information will be available in the NPSAS:96 Methodology Report. Table A-4 shows some sample standard errors for selected estimates in Table 1.

Computation of standard errors

To facilitate computation of standard errors for nonlinear statistics using the first-order Taylor series approximation, RTI defined analysis strata and analysis replicates. Each non-certainty sample institution was defined to be an analysis replicate, except when it contained fewer than four undergraduate students. It was then combined with another comparable institution to form an analysis replicate. Each certainty institution was divided into two random half-samples, each of which was defined to be an analysis replicate, except when that resulted in a replicate contained fewer than four responding undergraduate students. Those certainty institutions were then treated as individual replicates. The sample replicates (non-certainty institutions and half-samples of students from certainty institutions) were then assigned to analysis strata based on the nine institutional sampling strata and regional substrata. Analysis strata were defined to be large enough that each stratum which contained a graduate or first-professional (graduate or first-professional) student contained at least two replicates with four or more responding graduate/first-professional students to facilitate Taylor series variance computations for graduate/first-professional students.
