


Overall Results


- In 2009, the average score of fourth-grade students in Milwaukee was 196. This was lower than the average score of 210 for public school students in large cities.
- The percentage of students in Milwaukee who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 12 percent in 2009. This percentage was smaller than that in large cities (23 percent).
- The percentage of students in Milwaukee who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 39 percent in 2009. This percentage was smaller than that in large cities (54 percent).

Achievement-Level Percentages and Average Score Results




NOTE: Detail may not sum to totals because of rounding. Large cities are located in the urbanized areas of cities with populations of 250,000 or more.

Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2009, female students in Milwaukee had an average score that was higher than that of male students.
- In 2009, Black students had an average score that was 36 points lower than that of White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in large cities (32 points).
- In 2009, Hispanic students had an average score that was 25 points lower than that of White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in large cities (31 points).
- In 2009, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low income, had an average score that was 25 points lower than that of students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in large cities (28 points).

NOTE: Statistical comparisons are calculated on the basis of unrounded scale scores or percentages.
