


Overall Results

- In 2011, the average score of eighth-grade students in Los Angeles was 261. This was lower than the average score of 274 for public school students in large cities.
- The average score for students in Los Angeles in 2011 (261) was not significantly different from their average score in 2009 (258) and was higher than their average score in 2003 (245).
- In 2011, the score gap between students in Los Angeles at the 75th percentile and students at the 25th percentile was 50 points. This performance gap was not significantly different from that of 2003 (50 points).
- The percentage of students in Los Angeles who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 16 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (13 percent) and was greater than that in 2003 (7 percent).
- The percentage of students in Los Angeles who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 49 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (46 percent) and was greater than that in 2003 (32 percent).


Achievement-Level Percentages and Average Score Results



* Significantly different ($p < .05$) from district's results in 2011. Significance tests were performed using unrounded numbers.



Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2011, Black students had an average score that was 45 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2003 (43 points).
- In 2011, Hispanic students had an average score that was 36 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2003 (37 points).
- In 2011, male students in Los Angeles had an average score that was not significantly different from female students.
- In 2011, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 26 points lower than students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch. This performance gap was wider than that in 2003 (5 points).
