


Overall Results

- In 2011, the average score of eighth-grade students in Hillsborough County was 282. This was higher than the average score of 274 for public school students in large cities.
- The percentage of students in Hillsborough County who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 32 percent in 2011. This percentage was greater than large cities (26 percent).
- The percentage of students in Hillsborough County who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 72 percent in 2011. This percentage was greater than large cities (63 percent).


Achievement-Level Percentages and Average Score Results





Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2011, Black students had an average score that was 30 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from large cities (34 points).
- In 2011, Hispanic students had an average score that was 19 points lower than White students. This performance gap was narrower than large cities (27 points).
- In 2011, male students in Hillsborough County had an average score that was not significantly different from female students.
- In 2011, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 28 points lower than students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch. This performance gap was not significantly different from large cities (27 points).
