


Overall Results

- In 2011, the average score of fourth-grade students in Albuquerque was 235. This was not significantly different from the average score of 233 for public school students in large cities.
- The percentage of students in Albuquerque who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 34 percent in 2011. This percentage was greater than large cities (30 percent).
- The percentage of students in Albuquerque who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 76 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from large cities (74 percent).


Achievement-Level Percentages and Average Score Results




* Significantly different ($p < .05$) from Albuquerque. Significance tests were performed using unrounded numbers.

Score Gaps for Student Groups

- Data are not reported for Black students in 2011, because reporting standards were not met.
- In 2011, Hispanic students had an average score that was 25 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from large cities (23 points).
- In 2011, male students in Albuquerque had an average score that was not significantly different from female students.
- In 2011, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 26 points lower than students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch. This performance gap was not significantly different from large cities (23 points).
