


Overall Results

- In 2011, the average score of fourth-grade students in New York City was 216. This was higher than the average score of 211 for public school students in large cities.
- The average score for students in New York City in 2011 (216) was not significantly different from their average score in 2009 (217) and was higher than their average score in 2002 (206).
- In 2011, the score gap between students in New York City at the 75th percentile and students at the 25th percentile was 48 points. This performance gap was not significantly different from that of 2002 (48 points).
- The percentage of students in New York City who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 29 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (29 percent) and was greater than that in 2002 (19 percent).
- The percentage of students in New York City who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 61 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (62 percent) and was greater than that in 2002 (47 percent).


Achievement-Level Percentages and Average Score Results



* Significantly different ($p < .05$) from district's results in 2011. Significance tests were performed using unrounded numbers.



Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2011, Black students had an average score that was 26 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2002 (29 points).
- In 2011, Hispanic students had an average score that was 28 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2002 (25 points).
- In 2011, female students in New York City had an average score that was higher than male students by 9 points.
- In 2011, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 28 points lower than students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2002 (18 points).
