


The National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) assesses reading in three content areas: reading for literary experience, to gain information, and to perform a task. The NAEP reading scale ranges from 0 to 500.

Overall Reading Results for Texas

- In 2005, the average scale score for eighth-grade students in Texas was 258. This was not significantly different from¹ their average score in 2003 (259), and was not significantly different from their average score in 1998 (261).
- Texas' average score (258) in 2005 was lower than that of the Nation's public schools (260).
- Of the 52 states and other jurisdictions² that participated in the 2005 eighth-grade assessment, students' average scale scores in Texas were higher than those in 10 jurisdictions, not significantly different from those in 9 jurisdictions, and lower than those in 32 jurisdictions.
- The percentage of students in Texas who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 26 percent in 2005. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2003 (26 percent), and was not significantly different from that in 1998 (27 percent).
- The percentage of students in Texas who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 69 percent in 2005. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2003 (71 percent), and was smaller than that in 1998 (74 percent).



Average Score Gaps Between Selected Groups

- In 2005, male students in Texas had an average score that was lower than that of female students by 9 points. In 1998, the average score for male students was lower than that of female students by 10 points.
- In 2005, Black students had an average score that was lower than that of White students by 24 points. In 1998, the average score for Black students was lower than that of White students by 25 points.
- In 2005, Hispanic students had an average score that was lower than that of White students by 22 points. In 1998, the average score for Hispanic students was lower than that of White students by 22 points.
- In 2005, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of poverty, had an average score that was lower than that of students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch by 22 points. In 1998, the average score for students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch was lower than the score of those not eligible by 24 points.
- In 2005, the score gap between students at the 75th percentile and students at the 25th percentile was 46 points. This performance gap was wider than that of 1998 (41 points).

Reading Scale Scores at Selected Percentiles



Scores at selected percentiles on the NAEP reading scale indicate how well students at lower, middle, and higher levels of the distribution performed.

¹ Comparisons (higher/lower/not different) are based on statistical tests. The .05 level was used for testing statistical significance. Performance comparisons may be affected by differences in exclusion rates across years for students with disabilities (4% nationally in 2005) and English language learners (1% nationally in 2005) in the NAEP samples. Statistical comparisons are calculated on the basis of unrounded scale scores or percentages.

² "Other Jurisdictions" refers to the District of Columbia and the Department of Defense Education Activity schools.
