


The National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) assesses mathematics in five content areas: number properties and operations; measurement; geometry; data analysis and probability; and algebra. The NAEP mathematics scale ranges from 0 to 500.

Overall Mathematics Results for Illinois

- In 2007, the average scale score for eighth-grade students in Illinois was 280. This was not significantly different from their average score in 2005 (278) and was higher than their average score in 1990 (261).¹
- Illinois' average score (280) in 2007 was not significantly different from that of the nation's public schools (280).
- Of the 52 states and other jurisdictions that participated in the 2007 eighth-grade assessment, students' average scale score in Illinois was higher than those in 15 jurisdictions, not significantly different from those in 12 jurisdictions, and lower than those in 24 jurisdictions.²
- The percentage of students in Illinois who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 31 percent in 2007. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2005 (29 percent) and was greater than that in 1990 (15 percent).
- The percentage of students in Illinois who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 70 percent in 2007. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2005 (68 percent) and was greater than that in 1990 (50 percent).



Average Score Gaps Between Selected Groups

- In 2007, male students in Illinois had an average score that was not significantly different from that of female students. In 1990, there was no significant difference between the average score of male and female students.
- In 2007, Black students had an average score that was lower than that of White students by 38 points. In 1990, the average score for Black students was lower than that of White students by 38 points.
- In 2007, Hispanic students had an average score that was lower than that of White students by 26 points. In 1990, the average score for Hispanic students was lower than that of White students by 33 points.
- In 2007, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, a proxy for poverty, had an average score that was lower than that of students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch by 30 points. In 2000, the average score for students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch was lower than the score of those not eligible by 30 points.
- In 2007, the score gap between students at the 75th percentile and students at the 25th percentile was 48 points. In 1990, the score gap between students at the 75th percentile and students at the 25th percentile was 49 points.

¹ Comparisons (higher/lower/narrower/wider/not different) are based on statistical tests. The .05 level was used for testing statistical significance. Statistical comparisons are calculated on the basis of unrounded scale scores or percentages. Comparisons across jurisdictions and comparisons with the nation or within a jurisdiction across years may be affected by differences in exclusion rates for students with disabilities (SD) and English language learners (ELL). The exclusion rates for SD and ELL in Illinois were 5 percent and 1 percent in 2007, respectively. ² "Jurisdictions" refers to states and the District of Columbia and the Department of Defense Education Activity schools.
