


The National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) assesses reading in three content areas in grade 8: reading for literary experience, to gain information, and to perform a task. The NAEP reading scale ranges from 0 to 500.

Overall Reading Results for Ohio

- In 2007, the average scale score for eighth-grade students in Ohio was 268. This was not significantly different from their average score in 2005 (267) and was not significantly different from their average score in 2002 (268).¹
- Ohio's average score (268) in 2007 was higher than that of the nation's public schools (261).
- Of the 52 states and other jurisdictions that participated in the 2007 eighth-grade assessment, students' average scale score in Ohio was higher than those in 29 jurisdictions, not significantly different from those in 19 jurisdictions, and lower than those in 3 jurisdictions.²
- The percentage of students in Ohio who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 36 percent in 2007. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2005 (36 percent) and was not significantly different from that in 2002 (35 percent).
- The percentage of students in Ohio who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 79 percent in 2007. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2005 (78 percent) and was not significantly different from that in 2002 (82 percent).



Average Score Gaps Between Selected Groups

- In 2007, male students in Ohio had an average score that was lower than that of female students by 8 points. In 2002, the average score for male students was lower than that of female students by 6 points.
- In 2007, Black students had an average score that was lower than that of White students by 27 points. In 2002, the average score for Black students was lower than that of White students by 27 points.
- In 2007, Hispanic students had an average score that was not significantly different from that of White students (gap of 14 points). Data are not reported for Hispanic students in 2002, because reporting standards were not met.
- In 2007, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, a proxy for poverty, had an average score that was lower than that of students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch by 24 points. In 2002, the average score for students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch was lower than the score of those not eligible by 16 points.
- In 2007, the score gap between students at the 75th percentile and students at the 25th percentile was 42 points. In 2002, the score gap between students at the 75th percentile and students at the 25th percentile was 39 points.

¹ Comparisons (higher/lower/narrower/wider/not different) are based on statistical tests. The .05 level was used for testing statistical significance. Statistical comparisons are calculated on the basis of unrounded scale scores or percentages. Comparisons across jurisdictions and comparisons with the nation or within a jurisdiction across years may be affected by differences in exclusion rates for students with disabilities (SD) and English language learners (ELL). The exclusion rates for SD and ELL in Ohio were 9 percent and 1 percent in 2007, respectively. ² "Jurisdictions" refers to states and the District of Columbia and the Department of Defense Education Activity schools.
