


Overall Results

- In 2009, the average score of fourth-grade students in Washington was 242. This was higher than the average score of 239 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Washington in 2009 (242) was not significantly different from their average score in 2007 (243) and was higher than their average score in 1996 (225).
- In 2009, the score gap between students in Washington at the 75th percentile and students at the 25th percentile was 38 points. This performance gap was not significantly different from that of 1996 (39 points).
- The percentage of students in Washington who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 43 percent in 2009. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2007 (44 percent) and was greater than that in 1996 (21 percent).
- The percentage of students in Washington who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 84 percent in 2009. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2007 (84 percent) and was greater than that in 1996 (67 percent).


Achievement-Level Percentages and Average Score Results

Compare the Average Score in 2009 to Other States/ Jurisdictions



In 2009, the average score in **Washington** was

- lower than those in 7 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 23 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 21 states/jurisdictions

Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2009, male students in Washington had an average score that was not significantly different from that of female students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1996 (3 points).
- In 2009, Black students had an average score that was 20 points lower than that of White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1996 (27 points).
- In 2009, Hispanic students had an average score that was 20 points lower than that of White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1996 (25 points).
- In 2009, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of poverty, had an average score that was 20 points lower than that of students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1996 (20 points).
