


**Overall Results**

- In 2009, the average score of fourth-grade students in Colorado was 226. This was higher than the average score of 220 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Colorado in 2009 (226) was not significantly different from their average score in 2007 (224) and was higher than their average score in 1992 (217).
- In 2009, the score gap between students in Colorado at the 75th percentile and students at the 25th percentile was 47 points. This performance gap was not significantly different from that of 1992 (41 points).
- The percentage of students in Colorado who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 40 percent in 2009. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2007 (36 percent) and was greater than that in 1992 (25 percent).
- The percentage of students in Colorado who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 72 percent in 2009. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2007 (70 percent) and was greater than that in 1992 (64 percent).


**Achievement Level Percentages and Average Score Results**

**Compare the Average Score in 2009 to Other States/Jurisdictions**



In 2009, the average score in **Colorado** was

- lower than those in 4 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 28 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 19 states/jurisdictions

**Score Gaps for Student Groups**

- In 2009, female students in Colorado had an average score that was higher than that of male students.
- In 2009, Black students had an average score that was 24 points lower than that of White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1992 (21 points).
- In 2009, Hispanic students had an average score that was 32 points lower than that of White students. This performance gap was wider than that in 1992 (20 points).
- In 2009, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low income, had an average score that was 32 points lower than that of students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch. This performance gap was wider than that in 1998 (26 points).

NOTE: Statistical comparisons are calculated on the basis of unrounded scale scores or percentages.
