


Overall Results

- In 2009, the average score of fourth-grade students in New Jersey was 229. This was higher than the average score of 220 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in New Jersey in 2009 (229) was not significantly different from their average score in 2007 (231) and was higher than their average score in 1992 (223).
- In 2009, the score gap between students in New Jersey at the 75th percentile and students at the 25th percentile was 42 points. This performance gap was not significantly different from that of 1992 (45 points).
- The percentage of students in New Jersey who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 40 percent in 2009. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2007 (43 percent) and was greater than that in 1992 (35 percent).
- The percentage of students in New Jersey who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 76 percent in 2009. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2007 (77 percent) and was greater than that in 1992 (69 percent).

Compare the Average Score in 2009 to Other States/Jurisdictions



In 2009, the average score in **New Jersey** was

- lower than that in 1 state/jurisdiction
- higher than those in 44 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 6 states/jurisdictions

Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2009, female students in New Jersey had an average score that was higher than that of male students.
- In 2009, Black students had an average score that was 25 points lower than that of White students. This performance gap was narrower than that in 1992 (35 points).
- In 2009, Hispanic students had an average score that was 24 points lower than that of White students. This performance gap was narrower than that in 1992 (38 points).
- In 2009, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low income, had an average score that was 26 points lower than that of students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2003 (30 points).
