


Overall Results

- In 2011, the average score of fourth-grade students in Mississippi was 209. This was lower than the average score of 220 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Mississippi in 2011 (209) was not significantly different from their average score in 2009 (211) and was higher than their average score in 1992 (199).
- In 2011, the score gap between students in Mississippi at the 75th percentile and students at the 25th percentile was 48 points. This performance gap was not significantly different from that of 1992 (48 points).
- The percentage of students in Mississippi who performed at or above the NAEP Proficient level was 22 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (22 percent) and was greater than that in 1992 (14 percent).
- The percentage of students in Mississippi who performed at or above the NAEP Basic level was 55 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (55 percent) and was greater than that in 1992 (41 percent).


Achievement-Level Percentages and Average Score Results


Compare the Average Score in 2011 to Other States/Jurisdictions

- In 2011, the average score in **Mississippi** (209) was
- lower than those in 45 states/jurisdictions
 - higher than that in 1 state/jurisdiction
 - not significantly different from those in 5 states/jurisdictions

Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2011, Black students had an average score that was 22 points lower than White students. This performance gap was narrower than that in 1992 (31 points).
- In 2011, Hispanic students had an average score that was 17 points lower than White students. Data are not reported for Hispanic students in 1992, because reporting standards were not met.
- In 2011, female students in Mississippi had an average score that was higher than male students by 10 points.
- In 2011, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 27 points lower than students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (26 points).
