

Overall Results

- In 2011, the average score of fourth-grade students in New Hampshire was 230. This was higher than the average score of 220 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in New Hampshire in 2011 (230) was not significantly different from their average score in 2009 (229) and was not significantly different from their average score in 1992 (228).
- In 2011, the score gap between students in New Hampshire at the 75th percentile and students at the 25th percentile was 41 points. This performance gap was not significantly different from that of 1992 (39 points).
- The percentage of students in New Hampshire who performed at or above the NAEP Proficient level was 43 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (41 percent) and was greater than that in 1992 (38 percent).
- The percentage of students in New Hampshire who performed at or above the NAEP Basic level was 78 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (77 percent) and was not significantly different from that in 1992 (76 percent).

Compare the Average Score in 2011 to Other States/Jurisdictions



Score Gaps for Student Groups

- Data are not reported for Black students in 2011, because reporting standards were not met.
- In 2011, Hispanic students had an average score that was 15 points lower than White students. Data are not reported for Hispanic students in 1992, because reporting standards were not met.
- In 2011, female students in New Hampshire had an average score that was higher than male students by 10 points.
- In 2011, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 20 points lower than students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (19 points).
