


Overall Results

- In 2013, the average score of fourth-grade students in Miami-Dade was 223. This was higher than the average score of 212 for public school students in large cities.
- The average score for students in Miami-Dade in 2013 (223) was not significantly different from their average score in 2011 (221)
- The score gap between higher performing students in Miami-Dade (those at the 75th percentile) and lower performing students (those at the 25th percentile) was 44 points in 2013. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (42 points).
- The percentage of students in Miami-Dade who performed at or above the NAEP Proficient level was 35 percent in 2013. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2011 (32 percent) and in 2009 (31 percent).
- The percentage of students in Miami-Dade who performed at or above the NAEP Basic level was 70 percent in 2013. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2011 (67 percent) and in 2009 (68 percent).

Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2013, Black students had an average score that was 29 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (33 points).
- In 2013, Hispanic students had an average score that was 13 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (14 points).
- In 2013, female students in Miami-Dade had an average score that was higher than male students by 9 points.
- In 2013, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 23 points lower than students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (20 points).
