


Overall Results

- In 2013, the average score of fourth-grade students in Atlanta was 214. This was not significantly different from the average score of 212 for public school students in large cities.
- The average score for students in Atlanta in 2013 (214) was not significantly different from their average score in 2011 (212) and was higher than their average score in 2002 (195).
- The score gap between higher performing students in Atlanta (those at the 75th percentile) and lower performing students (those at the 25th percentile) was 52 points in 2013. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2002 (48 points).
- The percentage of students in Atlanta who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 27 percent in 2013. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2011 (24 percent) and was greater than that in 2002 (12 percent).
- The percentage of students in Atlanta who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 57 percent in 2013. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2011 (54 percent) and was greater than that in 2002 (35 percent).


Achievement-Level Percentages and Average Score Results



* Significantly different ($p < .05$) from district's results in 2013. Significance tests were performed using unrounded numbers.



Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2013, Black students had an average score that was 47 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2002 (58 points).
- In 2013, Hispanic students had an average score that was 43 points lower than White students. Data are not reported for Hispanic students in 2002, because reporting standards were not met.
- In 2013, female students in Atlanta had an average score that was higher than male students by 11 points.
- In 2013, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 45 points lower than students who were not eligible. This performance gap was wider than that in 2002 (25 points).
