


Overall Results

- In 2013, the average score of fourth-grade students in Fresno was 196. This was lower than the average score of 212 for public school students in large cities.
- The average score for students in Fresno in 2013 (196) was not significantly different from their average score in 2011 (194) and in
- The score gap between higher performing students in Fresno (those at the 75th percentile) and lower performing students (those at the 25th percentile) was 51 points in 2013. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (48 points).
- The percentage of students in Fresno who performed at or above the NAEP Proficient level was 13 percent in 2013. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2011 (11 percent) and in
- The percentage of students in Fresno who performed at or above the NAEP Basic level was 39 percent in 2013. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2011 (37 percent) and in 2009 (40 percent).

Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2013, Black students had an average score that was 31 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (25 points).
- In 2013, Hispanic students had an average score that was 26 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (23 points).
- In 2013, female students in Fresno had an average score that was higher than male students by 9 points.
- In 2013, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 31 points lower than students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (33 points).
