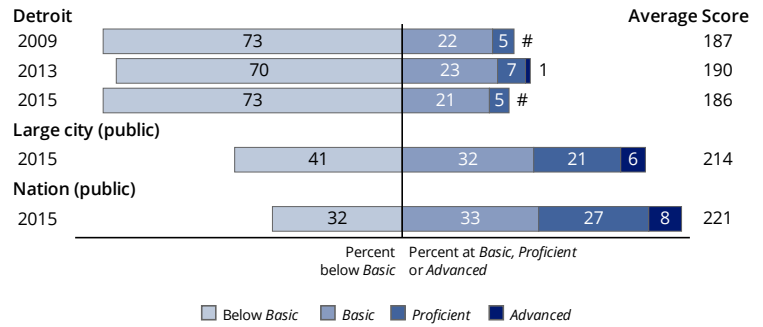


Overall Results

- In 2015, the average score of fourth-grade students in Detroit was 186. This was lower than the average score of 214 for public school students in large cities.
- The average score for students in Detroit in 2015 (186) was not significantly different from their average score in 2013 (190) and in 2009 (187).
- The percentage of students in Detroit who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 6 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (7 percent) and in 2009 (5 percent).
- The percentage of students in Detroit who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 27 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (30 percent) and in 2009 (27 percent).

Achievement-Level Percentages and Average Score Results



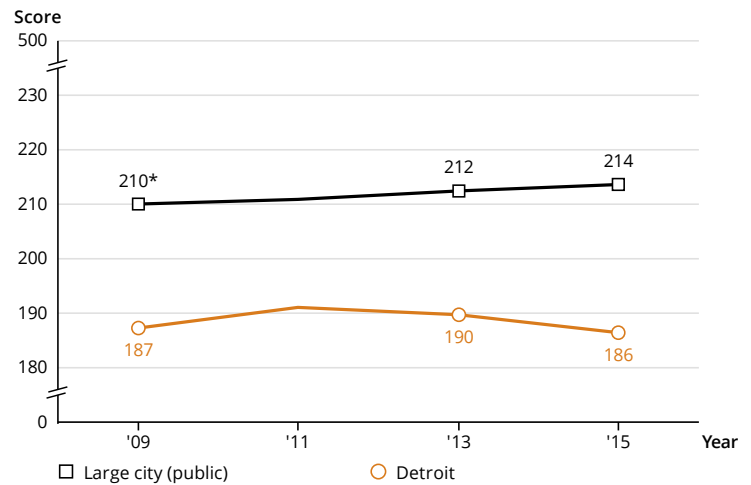

Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2015, Hispanic students had an average score that was 11 points higher than that for Black students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (4 points).
- In 2015, female students in Detroit had an average score that was higher than that for male students by 12 points.
- In 2015, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 3 points not significantly different from that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (6 points).
