


Overall Results

- In 2015, the average score of fourth-grade students in Chicago was 213. This was not significantly different from the average score of 214 for public school students in large cities.
- The average score for students in Chicago in 2015 (213) was higher than their average score in 2013 (206) and in 2002 (193).
- The percentage of students in Chicago who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 27 percent in 2015. This percentage was greater than that in 2013 (20 percent) and in 2002 (11 percent).
- The percentage of students in Chicago who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 58 percent in 2015. This percentage was greater than that in 2013 (51 percent) and in 2002 (34 percent).

Achievement-Level Percentages and Average Score Results





Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2015, Black students had an average score that was 45 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2002 (35 points).
- In 2015, Hispanic students had an average score that was 45 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was wider than that in 2002 (28 points).
- In 2015, female students in Chicago had an average score that was higher than that for male students by 9 points.
- In 2015, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 42 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2002 (32 points).
