

Overall Results

- In 2015, the average score of fourth-grade students in San Diego was 216. This was not significantly different from the average score of 214 for public school students in large cities.
- The average score for students in San Diego in 2015 (216) was not significantly different from their average score in 2013 (218) and was higher than their average score in 2003 (208).
- The percentage of students in San Diego who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 30 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (33 percent) and was greater than that in 2003 (22 percent).
- The percentage of students in San Diego who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 61 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (64 percent) and was greater than that in 2003 (51 percent).





Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2015, Black students had an average score that was 39 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2003 (35 points).
- In 2015, Hispanic students had an average score that was 36 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2003 (36 points).
- In 2015, female students in San Diego had an average score that was higher than that for male students by 9 points.
- In 2015, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 39 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was wider than that in 2003 (27 points).
