

Overall Results


- In 2015, the average score of fourth-grade students in Fresno was 199. This was lower than the average score of 214 for public school students in large cities.
- The average score for students in Fresno in 2015 (199) was not significantly different from their average score in 2013 (196) and in 2009 (197).
- The percentage of students in Fresno who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 13 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (13 percent) and in 2009 (12 percent).
- The percentage of students in Fresno who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 42 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (39 percent) and in 2009 (40 percent).

In 2015, the average score in Fresno (199) was



Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2015, Black students had an average score that was 35 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (25 points).
- In 2015, Hispanic students had an average score that was 25 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (23 points).
- In 2015, female students in Fresno had an average score that was not significantly different from that for male students.
- In 2015, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 45 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (33 points).
