


Overall Results

- In 2015, the average score of fourth-grade students in Los Angeles was 204. This was lower than the average score of 214 for public school students in large cities.
- The average score for students in Los Angeles in 2015 (204) was not significantly different from their average score in 2013 (205) and was higher than their average score in 2002 (191).
- The percentage of students in Los Angeles who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 21 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (19 percent) and was greater than that in 2002 (11 percent).
- The percentage of students in Los Angeles who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 50 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (50 percent) and was greater than that in 2002 (33 percent).

Achievement-Level Percentages and Average Score Results





Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2015, Black students had an average score that was 32 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2002 (37 points).
- In 2015, Hispanic students had an average score that was 36 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2002 (38 points).
- In 2015, female students in Los Angeles had an average score that was higher than that for male students by 9 points.
- In 2015, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 42 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was wider than that in 2002 (14 points).
