

Overall Results

- In 2015, the average score of fourth-grade students in Albuquerque was 207. This was lower than the average score of 214 for public school students in large cities.
- The average score for students in Albuquerque in 2015 (207) was not significantly different from their average score in 2013 (207) and in 2011 (209).
- The percentage of students in Albuquerque who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 24 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (24 percent) and in 2011 (24 percent).
- The percentage of students in Albuquerque who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 54 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (54 percent) and in 2011 (53 percent).

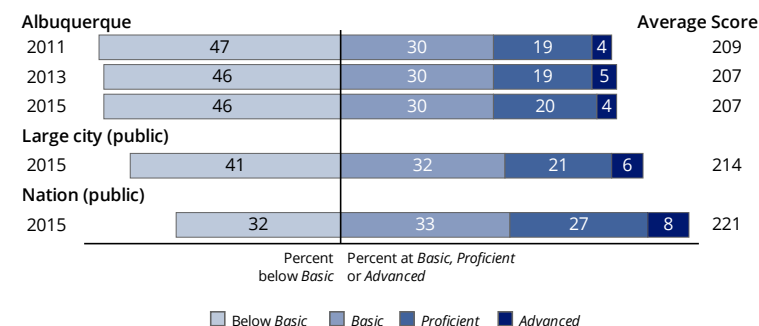

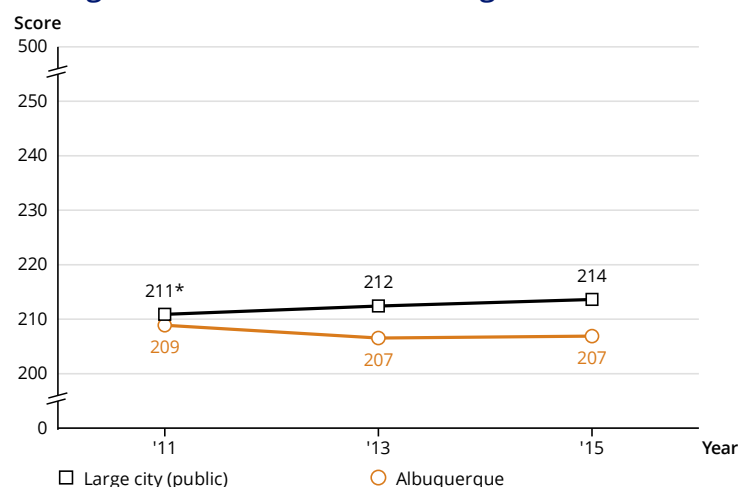

Score Gaps for Student Groups

- Data are not reported for Black students in 2015, because reporting standards were not met.
- In 2015, Hispanic students had an average score that was 25 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2011 (30 points).
- In 2015, female students in Albuquerque had an average score that was higher than that for male students by 9 points.
- In 2015, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 31 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2011 (33 points).
