

### Overall Results

- In 2015, the average score of fourth-grade students in Dallas was 204. This was lower than the average score of 214 for public school students in large cities.
- The average score for students in Dallas in 2015 (204) was not significantly different from their average score in 2013 (205) and in 2011 (204).
- The percentage of students in Dallas who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 17 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (16 percent) and in 2011 (14 percent).
- The percentage of students in Dallas who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 47 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (49 percent) and in 2011 (46 percent).





### Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2015, Black students had an average score that was 38 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2011 (32 points).
- In 2015, Hispanic students had an average score that was 40 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2011 (36 points).
- In 2015, female students in Dallas had an average score that was not significantly different from that for male students.
- In 2015, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 34 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2011 (24 points).
