

Overall Results

- In 2015, the average score of fourth-grade students in Austin was 220. This was higher than the average score of 214 for public school students in large cities.
- The average score for students in Austin in 2015 (220) was not significantly different from their average score in 2013 (221) and in 2005 (217).
- The percentage of students in Austin who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 35 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (36 percent) and was greater than that in 2005 (28 percent).
- The percentage of students in Austin who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 65 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (65 percent) and in 2005 (61 percent).





Score Gaps for Student Groups

- Data are not reported for Black students in 2015, because reporting standards were not met.
- In 2015, Hispanic students had an average score that was 41 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was wider than that in 2005 (32 points).
- In 2015, female students in Austin had an average score that was higher than that for male students by 9 points.
- In 2015, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 42 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was wider than that in 2005 (33 points).
