


Overall Results

- In 2015, the average score of eighth-grade students in Atlanta was 266. This was lower than the average score of 274 for public school students in large cities.
- The average score for students in Atlanta in 2015 (266) was not significantly different from their average score in 2013 (267) and was higher than their average score in 2003 (244).
- The percentage of students in Atlanta who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 20 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (17 percent) and was greater than that in 2003 (6 percent).
- The percentage of students in Atlanta who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 51 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (54 percent) and was greater than that in 2003 (30 percent).

Achievement-Level Percentages and Average Score Results





Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2015, Black students had an average score that was 61 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2003 (57 points).
- In 2015, Hispanic students had an average score that was 48 points lower than that for White students. Data are not reported for Hispanic students in 2003, because reporting standards were not met.
- In 2015, male students in Atlanta had an average score that was not significantly different from that for female students.
- In 2015, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 55 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was wider than that in 2003 (27 points).
