


### Overall Results

- In 2015, the average score of fourth-grade students in San Diego was 233. This was not significantly different from the average score of 234 for public school students in large cities.
- The average score for students in San Diego in 2015 (233) was lower than their average score in 2013 (241) and was higher than their average score in 2003 (226).
- The percentage of students in San Diego who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 31 percent in 2015. This percentage was smaller than that in 2013 (42 percent) and was greater than that in 2003 (20 percent).
- The percentage of students in San Diego who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 73 percent in 2015. This percentage was smaller than that in 2013 (81 percent) and was greater than that in 2003 (66 percent).

### Achievement-Level Percentages and Average Score Results





### Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2015, Black students had an average score that was 37 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was wider than that in 2003 (27 points).
- In 2015, Hispanic students had an average score that was 32 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2003 (27 points).
- In 2015, male students in San Diego had an average score that was not significantly different from that for female students.
- In 2015, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 35 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was wider than that in 2003 (21 points).
