


Overall Results

- In 2015, the average score of fourth-grade students in Philadelphia was 217. This was lower than the average score of 234 for public school students in large cities.
- The average score for students in Philadelphia in 2015 (217) was lower than their average score in 2013 (223) and was not significantly different from their average score in 2009 (222).
- The percentage of students in Philadelphia who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 15 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (19 percent) and in 2009 (16 percent).
- The percentage of students in Philadelphia who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 54 percent in 2015. This percentage was smaller than that in 2013 (62 percent) and in 2009 (61 percent).

Achievement-Level Percentages and Average Score Results





Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2015, Black students had an average score that was 24 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (23 points).
- In 2015, Hispanic students had an average score that was 24 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (18 points).
- In 2015, male students in Philadelphia had an average score that was not significantly different from that for female students.
- In 2015, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 13 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (23 points).
