## 2017 Mathematics Trial Urban District Snapshot Report Albuquerque • Grade 4 - Public Schools

## Overall Results

- In 2017, the average score of fourth-grade students in Albuquerque was 230. This was not significantly different from the average score of 232 for public school students in large cities.
- The average score for students in Albuquerque in 2017 (230) was not significantly different from their average score in 2015 (231) and was lower than their average score in 2011 (235).
- The percentage of students in Albuquerque who performed at or above the NAEP Proficient level was 29 percent in 2017. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2015 (28 percent) and was smaller than that in 2011 (34 percent).
- The percentage of students in Albuquerque who performed at or above the NAEP Basic level was 68 percent in 2017. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2015 (72 percent) and was smaller than that in 2011 (76 percent).

## Score Gaps for Student Groups

- Data are not reported for Black students in 2017, because reporting standards were not met.
- In 2017, Hispanic students had an average score that was 25 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2011 (25 points).
- In 2017, male students in Albuquerque had an average score that was not significantly different from that for female students.
- In 2017, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 30 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2011 (26 points).
