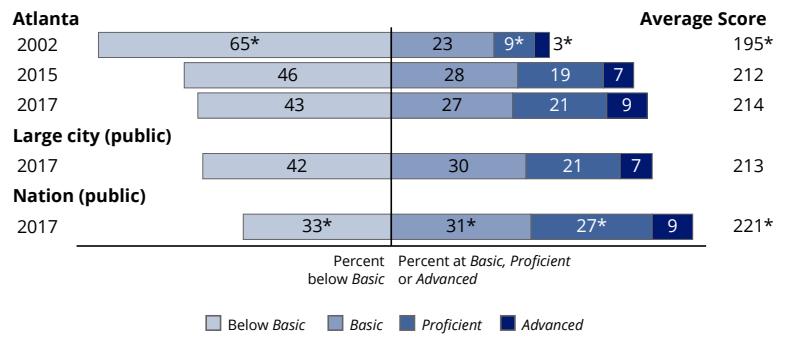


Overall Results

- In 2017, the average score of fourth-grade students in Atlanta was 214. This was not significantly different from the average score of 213 for public school students in large cities.
- The average score for students in Atlanta in 2017 (214) was not significantly different from their average score in 2015 (212) and was higher than their average score in 2002 (195).
- The percentage of students in Atlanta who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 30 percent in 2017. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2015 (26 percent) and was greater than that in 2002 (12 percent).
- The percentage of students in Atlanta who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 57 percent in 2017. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2015 (54 percent) and was greater than that in 2002 (35 percent).

Achievement-Level Percentages and Average Score Results



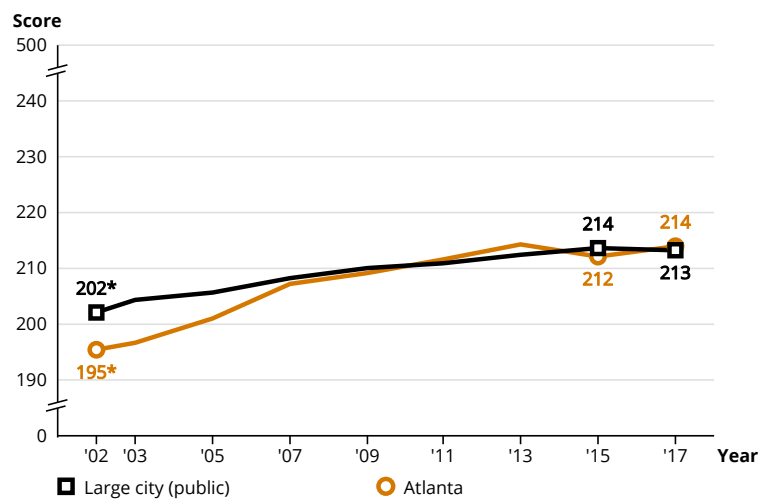

Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2017, Black students had an average score that was 48 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2002 (58 points).
- In 2017, Hispanic students had an average score that was 47 points lower than that for White students. Data are not reported for Hispanic students in 2002, because reporting standards were not met.
- In 2017, female students in Atlanta had an average score that was higher than that for male students by 8 points.
- In 2017, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 49 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was wider than that in 2002 (25 points).
