

## 2017 Reading Trial Urban District Snapshot Report

Jefferson County, KY - Grade 4 - Public Schools

#### **Overall Results**


- In 2017, the average score of fourth-grade students in Jefferson County was 221. This was higher than the average score of 213 for public school students in large cities.
- The average score for students in Jefferson County in 2017 (221) was not significantly different from their average score in 2015 (222) and in 2009 (219).
- The percentage of students in Jefferson County who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 35 percent in 2017. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2015 (36 percent) and in 2009 (30 percent).
- The percentage of students in Jefferson County who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 65 percent in 2017. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2015 (67 percent) and in 2009 (64 percent).

In 2017, the average score in Jefferson County (KY) (221) was




# Achievement-Level Percentages and Average Score Results

### **Score Gaps for Student Groups**

- In 2017, Black students had an average score that was 32 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (27 points).
- In 2017, Hispanic students had an average score that was 20 points lower than that for White students. Data are not reported for Hispanic students in 2009, because reporting standards were not met
- In 2017, female students in Jefferson County had an average score that was not significantly different from that for male students.
- In 2017, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 31 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (28 points).



NOTE: The NAEP reading scale ranges from 0 to 500. Beginning in 2009, results for charter schools are excluded from the TUDA results if they are not included in the school district's Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) report to the U.S. Department of Education. Statistical comparisons are calculated on the basis of unrounded scale scores or percentages.
