Overall Results

Nation's Report Card


- In 2017, the average score of eighth-grade students in Detroit was 235. This was lower than the average score of 258 for public school students in large cities.
- The average score for students in Detroit in 2017 (235) was not significantly different from their average score in 2015 (237) and in 2009 (232).
- The percentage of students in Detroit who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 7 percent in 2017. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2015 (7 percent) and in 2009 (7 percent).
- The percentage of students in Detroit who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 41 percent in 2017. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2015 (44 percent) and in 2009 (40 percent).


Achievement-Level Percentages and Average Score Results

Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2017, Hispanic students had an average score that was 8 points higher than that for Black students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (0 points).
- In 2017, female students in Detroit had an average score that was higher than that for male students by 12 points.
- In 2017, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 3 points not significantly different from that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (13 points).
