
2019 Reading Trial Urban District Snapshot Report

Albuquerque ■ Grade 4 ■ Public Schools

Overall Results

- In 2019, the average score of fourth-grade students in Albuquerque was 208. This was lower than the average score of 212 for students in large cities.
- The average score for students in Albuquerque in 2019 (208) was not significantly different from their average score in 2017 (207) and in 2011 (209).
- The percentage of students in Albuquerque who performed at or above the NAEP Proficient level was 25 percent in 2019. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2017 (24 percent) and in 2011 (24 percent).
- The percentage of students in Albuquerque who performed at or above the NAEP Basic level was 54 percent in 2019. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2017 (53 percent) and in 2011 (53 percent).

^{*} Significantly different (p < .05) from district's results in 2019. Significance tests were performed using unrounded numbers



Score Gaps for Student Groups

- Data are not reported for Black students in 2019, because reporting standards were not met.
- In 2019, Hispanic students had an average score that was 31 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2011 (30 points).
- In 2019, female students in Albuquerque had an average score that was higher than that for male students by 10 points.
- In 2019, students who were eligible for the National School Lunch Program (NSLP), had an average score that was 37 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2011 (33 points).



NOTE: The NAEP reading scale ranges from 0 to 500. Results presented in this report are based on public school students only. Beginning in 2009, results for charter schools are excluded from the TUDA results if they are not included in the school district's Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) report to the U.S. Department of Education. Statistical comparisons are calculated on the basis of unrounded scale scores or percentages. Score gap results for "White," "Black," and "Hispanic" presented in this report are based on the 6-category race/ethnicity variable with data available starting in early 1990s.
