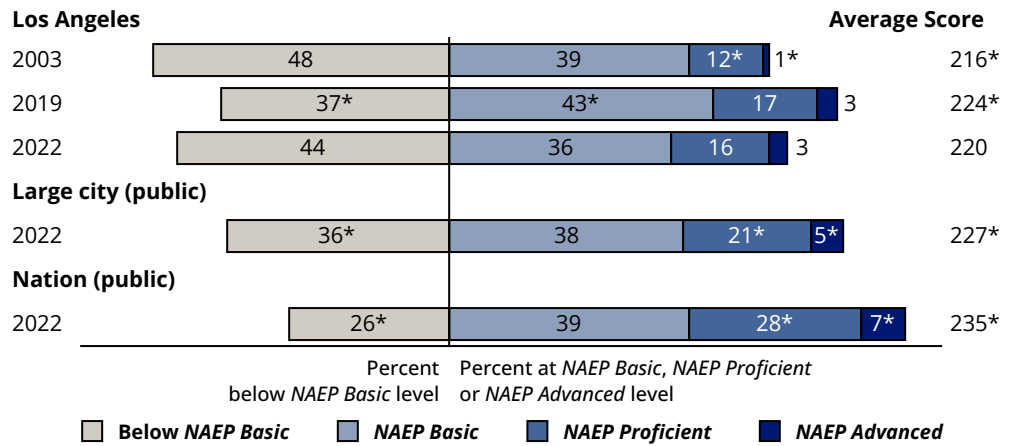


OVERALL RESULTS

- In 2022, the average score of fourth-grade students in Los Angeles was 220. This was lower than the average score of 227 for students in large cities.
- The average score for students in Los Angeles in 2022 (220) was lower than their average score in 2019 (224) and was higher than their average score in 2003 (216).
- The percentage of students in Los Angeles who performed at or above the *NAEP Proficient* level was 20 percent in 2022. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2019 (20 percent) and was greater than that in 2003 (13 percent).
- The percentage of students in Los Angeles who performed at or above the *NAEP Basic* level was 56 percent in 2022. This percentage was smaller than that in 2019 (63 percent) and was not significantly different from that in 2003 (52 percent).

* Significantly different ($p < .05$) from the district's results in 2022. Significance tests were performed using unrounded numbers.

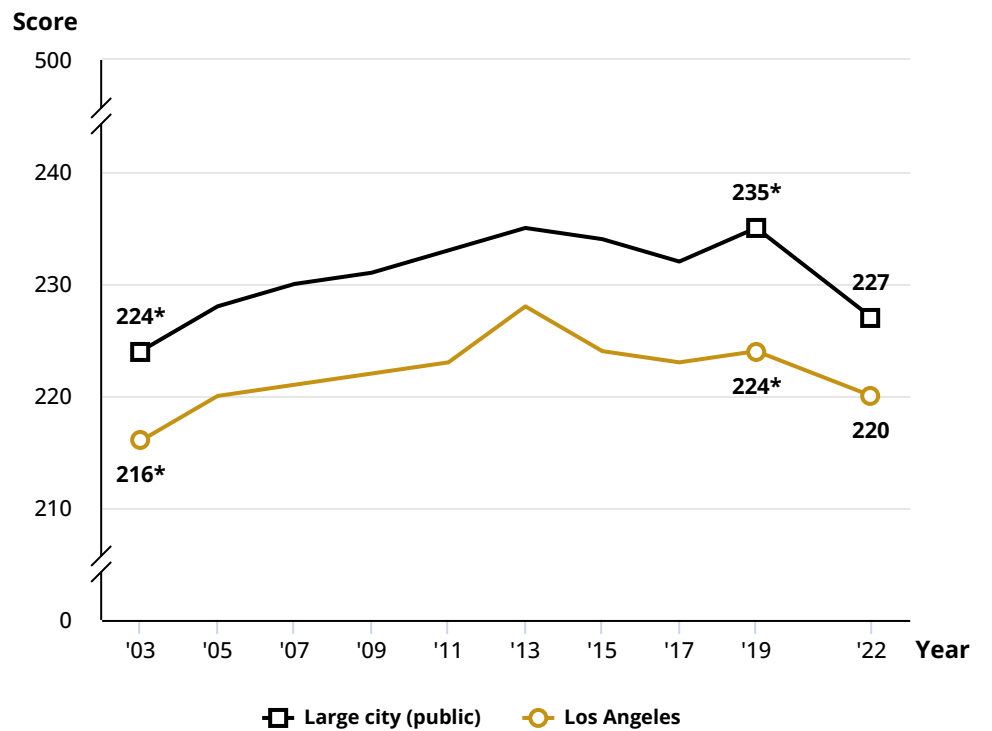

SCORE GAPS FOR STUDENT GROUPS

- In 2022, Black students had an average score that was 33 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2003 (33 points).
- In 2022, Hispanic students had an average score that was 34 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2003 (30 points).
- In 2022, male students in Los Angeles had an average score that was not significantly different from that for female students.
- In 2022, students who were eligible for the National School Lunch Program (NSLP) had an average score that was 43 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was wider than that in 2003 (17 points).
