


Overall Results

- In 2015, the average score of fourth-grade students in Illinois was 222. This was not significantly different from the average score of 221 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Illinois in 2015 (222) was not significantly different from their average score in 2013 (219) and was higher than their average score in 2003 (216).
- The percentage of students in Illinois who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 35 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (34 percent) and was greater than that in 2003 (31 percent).
- The percentage of students in Illinois who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 68 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (64 percent) and was greater than that in 2003 (61 percent).

Compare the Average Score in 2015 to Other States/Jurisdictions



In 2015, the average score in Illinois (222) was

- lower than those in 15 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 14 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 22 states/jurisdictions





Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2015, Black students had an average score that was 31 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2003 (34 points).
- In 2015, Hispanic students had an average score that was 22 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was narrower than that in 2003 (31 points).
- In 2015, female students in Illinois had an average score that was higher than that for male students by 5 points.
- In 2015, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 31 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2003 (35 points).
