


Overall Results

- In 2015, the average score of fourth-grade students in Kansas was 221. This was not significantly different from the average score of 221 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Kansas in 2015 (221) was not significantly different from their average score in 2013 (223) and in 1998 (221).
- The percentage of students in Kansas who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 35 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (38 percent) and in 1998 (34 percent).
- The percentage of students in Kansas who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 68 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (71 percent) and in 1998 (70 percent).

Compare the Average Score in 2015 to Other States/Jurisdictions



In 2015, the average score in Kansas (221) was

- lower than those in 18 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 11 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 22 states/jurisdictions





Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2015, Black students had an average score that was 29 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (30 points).
- In 2015, Hispanic students had an average score that was 19 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (25 points).
- In 2015, female students in Kansas had an average score that was higher than that for male students by 8 points.
- In 2015, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 30 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was wider than that in 1998 (23 points).
