


Overall Results


- In 2015, the average score of fourth-grade students in Michigan was 216. This was lower than the average score of 221 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Michigan in 2015 (216) was not significantly different from their average score in 2013 (217) and in 1998 (216).
- The percentage of students in Michigan who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 29 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (31 percent) and in 1998 (28 percent).
- The percentage of students in Michigan who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 63 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (64 percent) and in 1998 (62 percent).

Compare the Average Score in 2015 to Other States/Jurisdictions




In 2015, the average score in Michigan (216) was

- lower than those in 35 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 2 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 14 states/jurisdictions

Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2015, Black students had an average score that was 28 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (36 points).
- In 2015, Hispanic students had an average score that was 15 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (22 points).
- In 2015, female students in Michigan had an average score that was higher than that for male students by 5 points.
- In 2015, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 24 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (24 points).
