


Overall Results

- In 2015, the average score of fourth-grade students in North Dakota was 225. This was higher than the average score of 221 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in North Dakota in 2015 (225) was not significantly different from their average score in 2013 (224) and in 2002 (224).
- The percentage of students in North Dakota who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 37 percent in 2015. This percentage was greater than that in 2013 (34 percent) and was not significantly different from that in 2002 (34 percent).
- The percentage of students in North Dakota who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 73 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (73 percent) and in 2002 (71 percent).

Compare the Average Score in 2015 to Other States/Jurisdictions



In 2015, the average score in North Dakota (225) was

- lower than those in 9 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 21 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 21 states/jurisdictions





Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2015, Black students had an average score that was 20 points lower than that for White students. Data are not reported for Black students in 2002, because reporting standards were not met.
- In 2015, Hispanic students had an average score that was 24 points lower than that for White students. Data are not reported for Hispanic students in 2002, because reporting standards were not met.
- In 2015, female students in North Dakota had an average score that was not significantly different from that for male students.
- In 2015, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 19 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2002 (15 points).
