


### Overall Results

- In 2015, the average score of fourth-grade students in New Mexico was 207. This was lower than the average score of 221 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in New Mexico in 2015 (207) was not significantly different from their average score in 2013 (206) and in 1998 (205).
- The percentage of students in New Mexico who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 23 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (21 percent) and in 1998 (21 percent).
- The percentage of students in New Mexico who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 54 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (52 percent) and in 1998 (51 percent).

### Compare the Average Score in 2015 to Other States/Jurisdictions



In 2015, the average score in New Mexico (207) was

- lower than those in 51 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 0 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 0 states/jurisdictions





### Score Gaps for Student Groups

- Data are not reported for Black students in 2015, because reporting standards were not met.
- In 2015, Hispanic students had an average score that was 22 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (27 points).
- In 2015, female students in New Mexico had an average score that was higher than that for male students by 10 points.
- In 2015, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 24 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (30 points).
