


Overall Results

- In 2015, the average score of eighth-grade students in New York was 263. This was not significantly different from the average score of 264 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in New York in 2015 (263) was not significantly different from their average score in 2013 (266) and in 1998 (265).
- The percentage of students in New York who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 33 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (35 percent) and in 1998 (32 percent).
- The percentage of students in New York who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 73 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (76 percent) and in 1998 (76 percent).

Compare the Average Score in 2015 to Other States/Jurisdictions



In 2015, the average score in New York (263) was

- lower than those in 24 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 9 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 18 states/jurisdictions





Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2015, Black students had an average score that was 25 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (28 points).
- In 2015, Hispanic students had an average score that was 19 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was narrower than that in 1998 (28 points).
- In 2015, female students in New York had an average score that was higher than that for male students by 9 points.
- In 2015, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 22 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (25 points).
