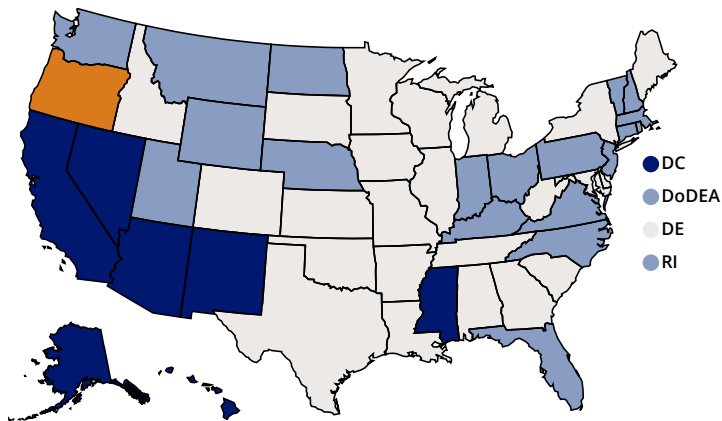


Overall Results

- In 2015, the average score of fourth-grade students in Oregon was 220. This was not significantly different from the average score of 221 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Oregon in 2015 (220) was not significantly different from their average score in 2013 (219) and was higher than their average score in 1998 (212).
- The percentage of students in Oregon who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 34 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (33 percent) and was greater than that in 1998 (26 percent).
- The percentage of students in Oregon who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 67 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (66 percent) and was greater than that in 1998 (58 percent).

Compare the Average Score in 2015 to Other States/Jurisdictions



In 2015, the average score in Oregon (220) was

- lower than those in 20 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 8 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 23 states/jurisdictions

DoDEA = Department of Defense Education Activity (overseas and domestic schools)

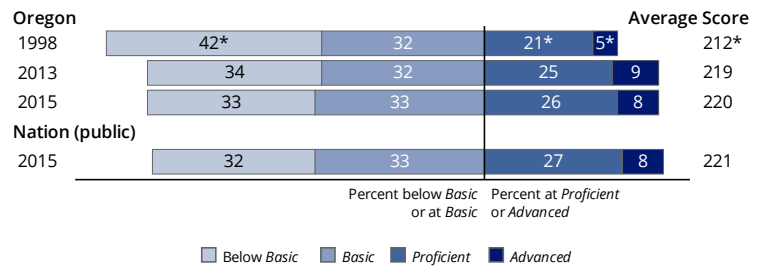

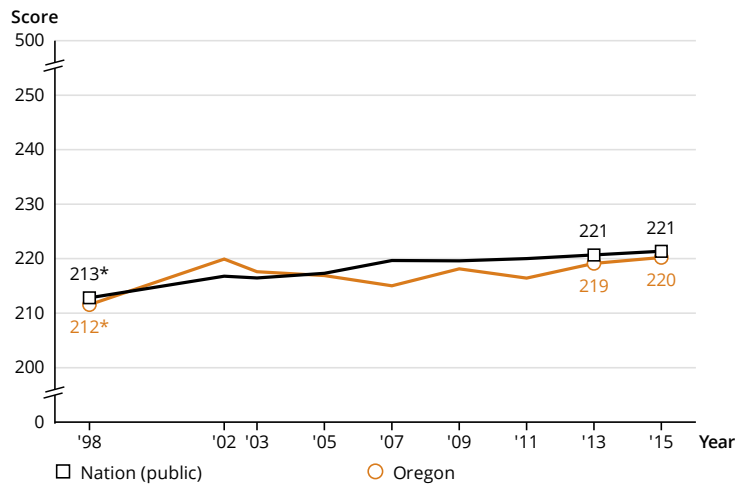

Score Gaps for Student Groups

- Data are not reported for Black students in 2015, because reporting standards were not met.
- In 2015, Hispanic students had an average score that was 25 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was narrower than that in 1998 (39 points).
- In 2015, female students in Oregon had an average score that was higher than that for male students by 7 points.
- In 2015, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 27 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (30 points).
