


Overall Results


- In 2015, the average score of eighth-grade students in Rhode Island was 265. This was not significantly different from the average score of 264 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Rhode Island in 2015 (265) was not significantly different from their average score in 2013 (267) and in 1998 (264).
- The percentage of students in Rhode Island who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 35 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (36 percent) and in 1998 (32 percent).
- The percentage of students in Rhode Island who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 76 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (77 percent) and in 1998 (76 percent).

Compare the Average Score in 2015 to Other States/Jurisdictions




In 2015, the average score in Rhode Island (265) was

- lower than those in 19 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 15 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 17 states/jurisdictions

Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2015, Black students had an average score that was 27 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (22 points).
- In 2015, Hispanic students had an average score that was 30 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (29 points).
- In 2015, female students in Rhode Island had an average score that was higher than that for male students by 10 points.
- In 2015, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 27 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (26 points).
