


Overall Results

- In 2015, the average score of fourth-grade students in Nebraska was 227. This was higher than the average score of 221 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Nebraska in 2015 (227) was higher than their average score in 2013 (223) and in 2002 (222).
- The percentage of students in Nebraska who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 40 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (37 percent) and was greater than that in 2002 (34 percent).
- The percentage of students in Nebraska who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 74 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (71 percent) and was greater than that in 2002 (68 percent).

Compare the Average Score in 2015 to Other States/Jurisdictions



In 2015, the average score in Nebraska (227) was

- lower than those in 4 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 27 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 20 states/jurisdictions





Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2015, Black students had an average score that was 26 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2002 (17 points).
- In 2015, Hispanic students had an average score that was 26 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2002 (23 points).
- In 2015, female students in Nebraska had an average score that was higher than that for male students by 9 points.
- In 2015, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 27 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2002 (22 points).
